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## TODAY AT THE STATE LEGISLATURE

Several Bills Passed.

STATEHOUSE, Salem, Oregon, Feb. 18.—Prohibition law violators may be put to work on the rock pile by sheriffs if house bill 264 passed by the house is passed by the senate and signed by the governor.

The use of seines on the coast streams entering the Pacific south of the Columbia, is prohibited by house bill 254, which has passed the house.

The senate has passed house bill 49 providing for creation of the Warner game refuge in Lake county.

The senate passed house bill 266 authorizing irrigation districts to enter into contracts with the United States government according to face finders' bill.

The house defeated the Banks bill providing for appeal from council license revocations.

Senate bill 173 requiring adjustment of claims under the Carey irrigation act passed the house.

The house passed senate bill 177, setting a speed limit of five miles an hour for entering a highway from a cross road.

The veto of Governor Pierce was sustained by the senate yesterday on house bill No. 215, which had for its purpose the authorizing of the state text book commission, to obtain at the lowest possible price text books for the purchase of which the publishing company's refused to extend contracts.

A strong fight was made in the state senate yesterday afternoon against house bill No. 215, increasing the salaries of the district attorneys of Oregon, but not quite strong enough to keep the bill from passing.

Supervise Farming.

STATEHOUSE, Salem, Oregon, Feb. 18.—That all farming operations at state institutions should be placed under the supervision of one man, to the end of saving the state an estimated \$100,000 a year, has been recommended to

the ways and means committee last night by a sub-committee of which Senator Beals was chairman and this recommendation will be submitted to the state board of control.

Losses in the farm operations at some of the institutions ascertained in an investigation by Beals and others caused the recommendation.

In making allowances for institutions the committee made provision for a new industrial building at the state insane hospital, the purchase of additional land at the eastern Oregon insane hospital and cattle to stock it, and a new building at the tuberculosis hospital.

The normal school policy was discussed at length last night on a motion by Senator Dunn that the committee report favorably on his bill to re-establish an Ashland normal school. The committee could not agree and further consideration of the bill was deferred until tonight.

Allowances by the committee last night, were: Deaf school \$112,000; girls school, \$63,840; training school, \$119,675; state hospital, \$960,408; Eastern Oregon hospital, \$617,800; institution for feeble minded, \$482,700; tuberculosis hospital, \$215,000; Oregon national guard (reconsidered) \$185,000.

Revenue Producing Bills.

### CLAIM ILLEGAL SEARCH MADE IN HARRIS TRIAL

residing on Lost Creek, and that the warrant not only fails to describe the property of any one, but does not even designate the property of any particular Harris.

It is also maintained that a search warrant must state whether or not goods to be taken are stolen goods or are to be seized for any other crime, and that in this instance no crime was alleged in the warrant.

It is further contended by the defense that a properly executed search warrant must set out with reasonable exactness the property or goods for which the search warrant is issued, while in this case it alleged only furniture and household goods belonging to J. C. Wamsley.

Prior to the trial of the case the defense moved to suppress the evidence, on the ground of an illegal search, but the motion was overruled by Judge Hamilton. During the trial of the case the defense objected to the introduction of the evidence and testimony based upon the search, but was again overruled.

After the state's testimony was in the defense examined two witnesses to bring out the facts of the search warrant, and then moved for a directed verdict. Further examination of witnesses was waived, and the defense made no argument.

The case went to the jury upon the state's evidence and a verdict of guilty was returned.

Attorney Albert Abraham, representing Mr. Harris, asked time in which to prepare a motion for a new trial, and was given until Friday to do so. Sentence will be passed at that time, and the defense attorneys, Mr. Abraham and Elbert Hermann, state that they expect to post bonds at that time for an appeal to the supreme court to determine the validity of the warrant upon which the search was made.

The court today worked on the case of R. W. Kuenzli against Sam Director. This case resulted from an automobile accident last July. The cars driven by the two principals in the action collided near Oakland, with considerable damage to both. Each driver declared himself to be right and the other to be wrong. Mr. Kuenzli filed suit against Mr. Director for \$319.40 to pay for the damages to his car, and Mr. Director immediately brought a counter suit for \$291.63. Attorney A. N. Orcutt appears for the plaintiff and Attorney Albert Abraham for the defense.

Would Increase Salaries.

STATEHOUSE, Salem, Oregon, Feb. 18.—Senator Upton today introduced a bill to increase the salaries of several Klamath county officials. The measure would increase the salaries of the county judge from \$12,000 to \$24,000, the pay of the commissioners from \$5 a day while on official business to \$1500 each a year, the treasurer from \$1500 to \$1800, the county clerk from \$2000 to \$2400 and the assessor from \$1500 to \$2400.

Defeat Convention Bill.

STATEHOUSE, Salem, Oregon, Feb. 18.—The house this morning by a vote of 27 to 15 defeated the pre-primary convention bill introduced by the Jackson county delegation.

Representative Cowgill, Jackson county, explained that he desired to see the bill passed and sent on to the senate, where objections might be brought out against the bill.

"It will probably be put to sleep as has the Mills bill," he said, "but it will give opportunity to bring out points of the measure, and later I hope to be able to draft another measure."

Representative Shumway of Morrow and Umatilla counties opposed the bill on the grounds that it would be a candidate's hands before he ran for election on a party ticket.

The house yesterday reconsidered its negative action on house bill 420 providing for a remission of tax penalties for 1921 to 1923. Following a short explanation by Representative Carlin at the real intent of the bill designed to help farmers who found themselves unable through hard crops at low prices to pay their taxes at the time, the house gave the measure a favorable vote. Provision of that remission of penalties shall not be made unless the original amount of taxes is paid by December 31, 1926.

been mentioned here. "In conversations with the American ambassador and is at present under consideration." Foreign Secretary Austin Chamberlain announced in the House of Commons today in answer to a question by Commander Kenworthy.

Questioned further Mr. Charles Chamberlain begged to be allowed to confine himself for the present to the foregoing statement.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—Informal discussion of a new arms conference, to be called by President Coolidge, has been proceeding in London, but officials here indicated today that no definite results had been attained.

The state department would not discuss the subject beyond authorizing the statement that the conversations had not yet reached the point of an exchange of formal notes.

It is assumed, in the absence of official comment that the steps taken look to an extension of the Washington naval treaty, so as to include a limitation on auxiliary craft as well as capital ships.

Such a project was under consideration there at the time the League of Nations brought forward its plan for an arms conference to be held under league auspices. That plan since encountered obstacles and President Coolidge has said he only awaited an opportune moment to make a conference suggestion of his own.

**Senate Bills Passed.**

STATEHOUSE, Salem, Oregon, Feb. 18.—With overwhelming approval the first move for a constitutional convention for Oregon in the year 1930 was taken today when the senate passed the Klepper bill which is senate bill No. 227. Only Senator Zimmermann voted against the bill.

The house this morning passed senate bill 24, a voluminous measure of 120 pages, amending the present state bank code and incorporating new material taken chiefly from the banking laws of New York and California. No opposition was voiced against the bill.

Sales and possession of revolvers and pistols would be sharply regulated under house bill 457, passed by the house this morning. In case of persons convicted of having concealed weapons on their person when committing a crime, an additional sentence of not less than five or more than 10 years in the penitentiary could be imposed.
