CIVIL SERVICE IS SWAMPED WITH HELP. (Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—Examinations for a thousand positions were held by the civil service commission last year, and 21,000 more persons entered them than in the year before. The commission reports today that 18,000 persons competed in the examination for general clerical positions and 15,000 for the stenographic. Operations of the commission were featured for the first time by radio which was said to have proven an effective means of reaching persons interested in the examinations.
