## CENSORSHIP BILL IS NOT FAVORED

"The picture business, which today is the latest form of expression," said Melvin G. Winstock, who has been doing public speaking in Roseburg, "is too big and potent a factor in human life, to justify petty, irresponsible, political censorship. I am utterly opposed to the proposed bill before the Oregon legislature and if house and senate should pass same, Governor Pierce ought to veto it."

"Various states of the Union have tried this and everywhere it has failed. In three years it has cost the State of New York nearly \$700,000 and the cost is daily mounting. Today the State is attempting to repeal the law. For ten years the United States Senate has had before it a National Motion Picture Censorship bill. It is still in committee where it will remain. Censorship was put to a vote of the people in Massachusetts and was defeated by 409,000 votes."

"No three men in spite of best intention can be entrusted with the unlimited power which this repressive law would seek to confer. Censors are political appointees who come to the work without experience to take judgment, from which there can be no appeal, which may result in the confiscation of brain work of years and money invested to the extent of millions."

"No man or company has a right to make, lease or exhibit anything of an immoral obscene or indecent nature. But we have in the Oregon criminal code today a splendid provision covering this. Such is the American way. It can lead only to evil far greater than that which it seeks to correct to deny any citizen or art or industry his right of a day in Court, a right granted to the most abandoned criminal."

### RADIO BEING USED FOR CLASSROOM INSTRUCTION

OAKLAND, Cal., Feb. 20.—Radio broadcasting has been found to be of real value in classroom instruction, and the subject found best suited for the purpose is penmanship and drawing, according to Dr. Virgil E. Dickson, head of the department for "Research and Guidance" in the Oakland public schools.

Dr. Dickson now has a committee working to perfect details to lessen material preparation and instruction of radio teachers, who must learn an entirely new technique of thinking, talking and writing compared with what they have experienced in "contact" instruction.

Drawing, particularly over the radio, has evoked greater originality on the part of the pupil than when instruction was given by the teacher in person. Many new ideas, valuable to educators, have been discovered. Entirely new fields of possibility have been opened up as a result of the experiments, according to Dr. Dickson, and a new era of educational methods is likely to be inaugurated, he believes.

In experiments conducted through KGO, the General Electric broadcasting station here, it has been the aim to have no more than ten classes, in as many different schools, listening to a lesson, so that control might be kept on how the listening was done, and tabulation of results, and the discovery of facts concerning the mechanical problems of radio reception. The size of the average class receiving instruction at any one time was about 500 pupils.

### APPEAL PLANNED TO AID DELINQUENT BOYS

CHICAGO, Feb. 20.—Plans for the production of "The Passion Play" several times a year in Chicago, the proceeds from which would be turned to the juvenile court to aid in its work of reclaiming boys who have drifted into lawlessness, was announced today by Cornelius C. Crane, superintendent of the Big Brothers Society, the sponsor.

The play will be given in five acts and 14 scenes, in the home of the Chicago Civic Opera company. The first performance is announced for March 15. Principals in the cast have been chosen with a view to continuing them in similar roles year after year. Mr. Crane said.

"Our workers in the juvenile and boys courts have noticed an increase in juvenile crime," Mr. Crane asserted. "The Big Brothers" is an organization of business and professional men here who reclaim boys delinquents, decided to do something to offset the influences. We collected a sum of money with which to hire the producer stage producers, actors and writers who could produce "The Passion Play" in an reverent and a manner as possible. We think the play would impress and regenerate thousands of youngsters in the crowds and it would equip the Big Brothers with a sum of money for the expansion of their educational work among delinquent boys."

"Every cent of profit is to go to this anti-crime work among the boys who come into Chicago's courts."

### SEAL SUPPLY FISHERIES

NEVIN, Eng., Feb. 20.—A plague of seals along the South Carnarvonshire coast recently put the fishermen temporarily out of business and caused the government ministry of fisheries much annoyance. The seals ate the fish nearly as fast as the fishermen could catch them, for a time, and often tore empty nets to pieces as if they were bent on showing their dislike at finding their "dinner buckets" empty.

On one occasion the seals swarmed into the fishermen's favorite haunts in such numbers that the gunboat H. M. S. Doon was dispatched to Carnarvon Bay and, with the aid of residents along the coast, who brought out their hunting pieces, 15 seals were killed in one drive, but even this did not put an end to the pest. Another time, Lord Waverley and a party of friends who were playing golf, saw a drive of seals sunning themselves on the rocks and abandoning golf sticks for rifles, killed five one day and ate the next.

It has been established that the seals have a breeding place in caves near Nevin, and the government is considering what steps to take to rid the coast of the nuisance. The seals of this colony are known as the common seal and the gray seal, which have inhabited various parts of the British coasts for many generations, but not in such numbers, ordinarily, as to cause such an inconvenience to fishermen. The fur of these specimens has no particular value commercially.

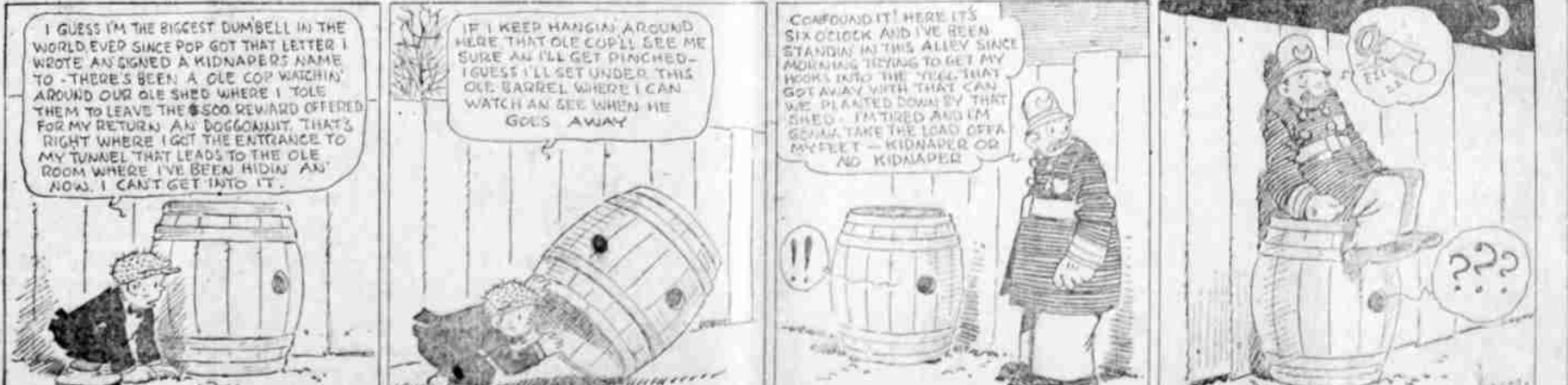
