BRITISH FAVOR CONFERENCE ON ARMAMENT NOW

Would Establish International Peace on a Much Firmer Basis.

U. S. IS GRATIFIED

Word From London Received by Officials in Washington Who Are Pleased.

LONDON, Feb. 20.—Another step toward bringing about a new limitation of armaments conference in Washington developed today when it was announced in diplomatic circles that the attitude of the British government that it was time to back up any move by the United States to establish international peace on a firmer basis.

While the conversations designed to bring about such a conference had been going on for some time in London and Paris, as well as in Tokyo, it was stated, it was considered that the plans for the conference were well along now in the preliminary stage and that the conference was likely to be called for the coming summer.

This was predicted on the understanding that the attitude of the Americans who have been consulted was to endeavor to set a date which would make it possible for Austin Chamberlain, British secretary for foreign affairs to attend the conference, and that he had promised to make the journey to Washington if possible.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—Unofficial reports of British willingness to cooperate toward limitation of naval armaments conference were received by officials here today with gratification. Similar expressions of cooperation from Paris and other capitals will necessarily be awaited, however, before any step of a formal kind, relating to the question of time and place for the conference can be given any serious consideration.

NEW FISH BILL TO PUT CROCKER ON STATE BOARD

Amended Fish Commission Bill Would Make Roseburg Man Appointee.

VETO IS EXPECTED

Governor Pierce Expected to Fight Attempt to Take Appointive Power From Office.

STATE HOUSE, Salem, Ore., Feb. 20.—An amended fish commission bill naming E. P. Kendall, incumbent of Portland; Walter Eakin of Astoria, incumbent, and L. L. Crocker of Roseburg, as members of the commission was returned to the house today by the judiciary committee, following a tilt in the house yesterday over the bill which aims to take the appointive power from the governor.

The amendment would take the appointive power away from the governor only on this occasion, and restore it to him later. The original bill which would have placed the power in the board of control, was introduced by Senator Ritter and passed the senate February 12.

When it came up for third reading in the house yesterday it was referred to the judiciary committee on motion of Representative Hamilton.

When told of the amendment this morning, Governor Walter M. Pierce bantered playfully with his first and declared: "I'll veto that just like I'll veto any other measure that seeks to take away from the governor's office any invested power."

The appointment of Mr. Crocker upon this commission was proposed in the bill returned to the house today, is the result of the promise of Governor Pierce to appoint a man from the second district upon the commission.

It was at first proposed to appoint Jefferson Myers of Portland, a personal friend of Governor Pierce to the office, but Mr. Myers is a resident of Portland, where Mr. Kendall also lives. Roseburg is in the second district, and Governor Pierce had previously promised that a representative of the second district would be placed upon the board.

Mr. Crocker was active in the formation of the Roseburg Rod and Gun Club and has always taken a keen interest in fish and game matters. He has been in close connection with the commission and its activities in recent years and is thoroughly conversant with its duties and work.

surface from exits other than that in which the explosion occurred. "Two men are dead, according to the information I have here now, while three others are seriously injured," he said.

"This would leave 35 still in the mine and there is little chance for them to be taken out alive, if my information is correct."

The mine is 250 feet deep. It is less than two years old. Representatives of the operators here have the official details of the explosion except that several of the miners had been killed.

STUDENT POISONING BEING INVESTIGATED

COLUMBUS, O., Feb. 20.—Governor Vic Donahey today requested M. M. Ford, secretary of the Ohio state board of pharmacy to conduct a special examination of the poisoning of Ohio state university students here several weeks ago with a view of prosecuting the person or persons responsible for the alleged laxity in the conduct of the university dispensary.

The investigation must not end, Governor Donahey told Ford, until every resource has been exhausted. The governor said he was convinced from informal evidence called to his attention that the university dispensary was loosely conducted.

Two Ohio state university students died from effects of cyanide poisoning, which they received at the university dispensary when they called for quinine capsules.

GRAZED MEXICAN KILLS 6 PEOPLE

GUAYAMAS, Sonora, Mex., Feb. 20.—Grazed from smoking marijuana, Extrado Valle, 25, a former member of the marine corps of the Mexican army, ran amok today in a hospital with a butcher knife and killed six people before he could be subdued.

Valle was employed at the hospital, and, according to stories told the police, he went to the kitchen and seized a butcher knife and stabbed the cook and attendant and then ran into one of the wards and stabbed and killed four patients before he was felled by another hospital employe.

Police say that after he was taken to the jail and quitted he denied all knowledge of the affray and protested he was innocent.

As this is the second case of a marijuana addict running amok in Guayamas in the past year, the police have redoubled their efforts to stop the traffic in the drug.

Children born as a result of such marriages are also legitimized. The measure is for the certain persons coming under the purview of the state industrial accident commission and the bonus and loan act.

House bill 370 providing for compulsory automobile liability insurance to be handled by the state industrial accident commission was chloroformed in the house this morning by indefinite postponement.

Indefinite postponement also was the fate of house bill 114 setting the salmon catch limit by trolling on the lower Rogue river at two Chinooks and four silver-sides a day.
