FRED WORTHINGTON DIES AT PORTLAND

Fred Worthington, aged 33 years, a brother of Henry Worthington of this city, and of Aleck and George Worthington of Days Creek, died yesterday in the veteran's hospital at Portland, following a short illness. He had been employed as a machinist in a logging camp at Coquille, until the 7th of February, when he was stricken with paralysis. He was taken to Portland last week, where he was given medical attention, but his condition became worse until his death yesterday.

He was born in Roseburg, and was educated in the public schools here. At the outbreak of the war he was a member of the local national guard company and was in the service for the duration of the war, being overseas for a large part of the time.

Upon his return he obtained employment as a machinist on the coasts, and has been in Coos county most continuously.

Resides his mother, Mrs. Anna Worthington, who has been making her home at Coquille, he leaves five brothers and four sisters.

No arrangements have yet been made for the funeral services.

SNOW STORAGE AT CRATER LAKE GREAT

MEDFORD, Ore., Feb. 24.—A later season at Crater Lake than usual and a larger supply of water for Southern Oregon than for many years, will result from the record breaking storage of snow along the Cascade divide this year, according to Peter Oard, the park ranger, who talked to the Medford last night that there are now 18 feet of snow at Crater Lake rim. Moreover, the snow is packed down and frozen, so that the water content is believed to be twice the average usually found at this time of the year, according to Oard.

DEPOSED BOY EMPEROR TAKES TRIP

PEKING, Feb. 24.—Hsuan Tung, the deposed emperor of China, has gone to Tien Tsin.

Hsuan Tung was forced to leave the imperial palace in the forbidden city early last November after the seizure of Peking by Feng Yihsiang. Hsuan first went to the home of the former regent, Prince Chun, but later took refuge in the Japanese legation in Peking. This move was said at the time to have been made with the consent of other interested legations and on the advice of Hsuan's English tutor, who accompanied him.
