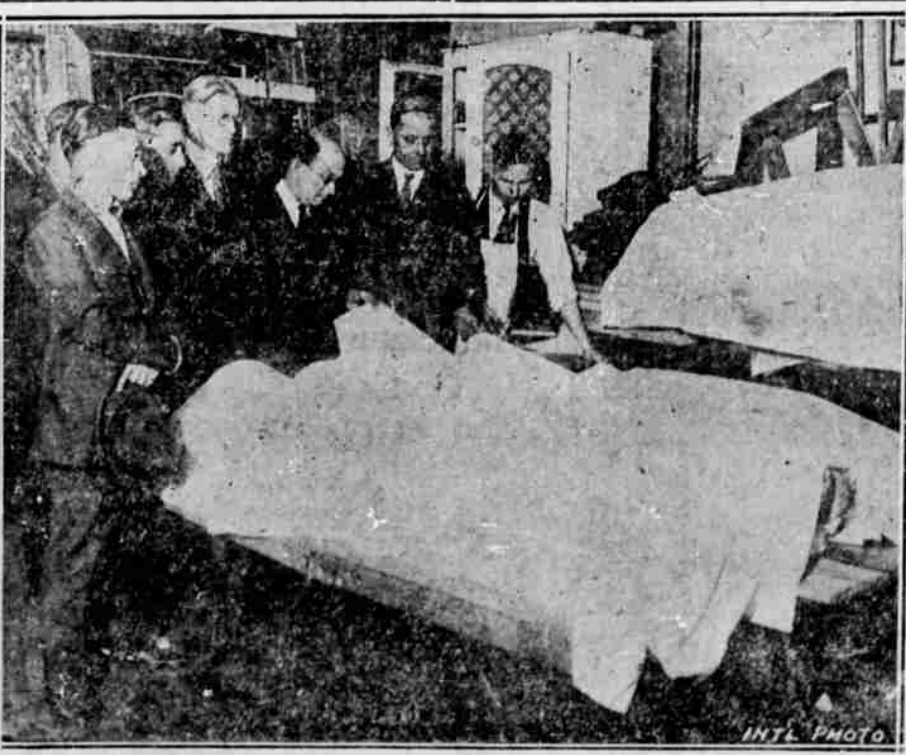
ESCAPED CONVICT IS CAUGHT IN N. Y.
