## ASH WEDNESDAY USHERS IN THE LENTEN SEASON

Rev. Dodge of Local Episcopal Church Explains Purpose of Observance

DENIAL AIDS THE SOUL

Period of Lent Draws Mind from Worldly Thoughts and Gives Refreshment to Soul.

The Lenten season was ushered in today by the observance of Ash Wednesday, which marks the beginning of this period of religious observance.

"Ash Wednesday derives its name from the ancient custom of sprinkling ashes upon the heads of penitents at the beginning of the penitential season of Lent," Rev. A. O. Dodge, of the local Episcopal church, said today. "Lent was a period of severe discipline, when offenders against the law of God were brought to book and underwent due correction."

"It is very much to be regretted that there is a laxity about the observance of Ash Wednesday; for in every church people who omit the proper observance of this important day are the losers. There is an old saying 'well begun, half done' which has much force when applied to the observance of Lent, inasmuch as those who neglect the observance of Ash Wednesday seldom make use of the season it ushers in, while attendance at its services indicates, at least, a desire to profit by the penitential season that follows."

"Let us briefly consider the value and meaning of Lent, for without doubt a proper estimate of it will greatly help us to arrange our work so that Ash Wednesday shall not pass unheeded by."

"In the first place, Lent is intended to be a time of Rest."

"The world is ever too much with us, and the round of worldly business and pleasure is pursued with a dull monotony almost to the complete exclusion of spiritual cultivation. The soul cries out for some attention—cries out to body and mind to pause awhile in their physical and intellectual pursuits in order to provide it also with an opportunity of development and growth."

"The season of Lent, corresponding in length to the period of our Blessed Lord's temptation, and dwelling upon the scenes of his humiliation as the result of our sins, not His, comes as an answer to that cry of the soul. The Churchman who neglects the due observance of Lent stifles the cry and crushes the yearnings of his higher nature."

"In the second place, Lent is intended to be a time of refreshment. It was never meant to be a season of dullness and monotony, rendered intolerably weary by the imposition of acts of self-denial, which have no meaning in themselves, and which bring no virtue into the life. Rather is it intended to be a season wherein, by a sensible rearrangement of working hours and by reasonable denial of certain pleasures, the life of the soul may for a time be more directly cultivated than is perhaps possible during the rest of the year. As each citizen looks forward to his annual holiday, so each Christian ought to look forward to the spiritual refreshment of Lent."

"In the third place, it becomes obvious that by providing rest from ceaseless preoccupation of worldly matters, and by supplying refreshment for the soul, Lent is

intended to be a time of spiritual growth.

"Let, then, one's chief ideas of this sacred season group themselves around the words: Rest, Refreshment, Growth."

"Now, the church, in her directions with regard to the observance of Lent, advises that special attention be paid to three points: "First, Prayer—because this involves taking our thoughts away from worldly matters, and concentrates them upon spiritual things."

"Second, Fasting—because this involves some definite bodily discipline, in order that the flesh may be subdued to the spirit, and the soul may obtain more ready union with the mind."

"Third, Almsgiving—because this involves, as the counterpart of prayer, removing our thoughts from our own needs, and fixing them upon the needs of others."

"A careful examination of these three acts of discipline, prayer, fasting and almsgiving, will show us how very necessary a due recognition of them is, in order that we may so detach the mind from the body as to provide the soul with its spiritual nourishment without which it will inevitably languish and die."

"If, then, we would make full use of the opportunity thus provided by the solemn and blessed season of Lent, we must begin deciding, on Ash Wednesday, upon the line we intend to pursue during the rest of the season."

"Let us be very careful about this, for if we are careless in the observance of the first day of Lent, the probability is that we shall remain careless till Lent is over; a golden opportunity will have passed, never to return, and some poor soul will be the loser throughout eternity."

"Consequently, our plans date up to Ash Wednesday, as in God's sight, to enter solemnly upon the three following resolutions, defining them as best we can to suit our own conditions of life: "First—To arrange our daily work in such a way that we cannot without degrading our neighbor, give more time to mental culture than upon the things of the earth."

"Second—To practice, unknown to any other human being, such acts of self-denial which shall assert the subjection of body and soul."

"Third—To spend the thought and money upon our neighbors, which is otherwise, over and above that which is our bounded duty, we should spend upon ourselves."

"The rest of the day should be occupied, as far as possible in acts of consecration, of placing our resolutions before God, and imploring the help of His Holy Spirit to enable us to keep them intact until Easter day."

"If Christians on Ash Wednesday would thus begin the season of Lent, they would be able to go through the holy season with renewed strength and vigor, knowing that a conscientious observance of the season thus begun would provide their souls—that is, their own, truly very selves—with the three supreme requirements of Rest, Refreshment and Growth."

## MR. LIVINGSTON DIES IN HOSPITAL

Newton Livingston, former resident, and a pioneer stockman of Grant and Douglas counties, died Monday at the Good Samaritan Hospital, in Portland, after an illness of several months. Mr. Livingston was born in Livingston county, Missouri, from whence he moved to Douglas county with the family. He had been engaged in stock raising in this county for a number of years, and served as Sheriff of Grant County for some time. He leaves four daughters, besides a number of nieces and nephews. Three of the daughters, Mrs. Boone Meyer, Mrs. H. Thompson, and Mrs. Emma Remington, are residents of Portland. Mr. Livingston leaves a number of friends in the city and vicinity, who will be grieved to learn of his death. The body will arrive here Thursday morning on Number 55, and will be taken directly to the Melrose cemetery for burial in the family tomb.

## PLANS FOR NEW HIGH SCHOOL ARE SUBMITTED

lower row of seats be extended slightly, and that a narrow platform be built in front of them, giving room for the ordinary school assemblies. Back of this narrow platform could be placed sliding doors, and the basketball court and stage could then be combined, or if additional space were needed for particularly large gatherings, the seats could then be set up on the gymnasium floor. The sliding doors would make possible a stage of any desired width.

The plans have several fine features, particularly in the arrangement for domestic science and commercial branches, as well as the science department. For domestic science, the domestic arts room, kitchen and pantry would all be grouped in one corner of the first floor, and would communicate with a large cafeteria which would be operated by the department, serving hot lunches to the pupils of the school or to others who might patronize the service.

The chemistry department would connect with the laboratory, lecture room and recitation hall, so that the science work could be kept grouped. The same is true of the commercial branches.

The study hall would be smaller than the one in the present building, being large enough to accommodate about 150 pupils, and would not be used for general assemblies. It is located at the front of the second floor, and is light and well ventilated.

The lower floor would be devoted largely to the arts classes, such as domestic science and art, chemistry, manual training, agriculture and commercial departments. There are also rest rooms for the girls, and rooms for both the women and men teachers. The offices and administration rooms would also be located on that floor.

The second floor would contain the study hall and a large number of recitation rooms. The building is compact, with practically no waste space, and special attention has been given the lighting and ventilating.

The board expects to spend considerable time going over the plans. Teachers will be called in and asked to make suggestions concerning their particular departments so that ideas may be gathered from those who are actually teaching the various subjects, giving a better opportunity to secure maximum efficiency.

## MARKETS

(Associated Press Special Wire.)

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 25.—Storage activities together with the arrival of the Lenten season had a strengthening effect on the local egg market today and prices soared higher. On the exchange quotations range from two to three points higher with extras posted at 33 cents, firsts at 32 cents and pullets at 30 cents a dozen.

Current receipts are in demand with bids out at 25 cents in the country. Net price on the exchange is 23 1/2c.

Receipts have been moderate so far this week with local requirements more in demand. Outside markets are not so strong although values have been on the upward swing.

The local butter market is showing a strong undertone with further advances in the print price not far distant. Extra cubes are a cent higher on the exchange at 45 cents. Other grades are unchanged with standards listed at 45 cents and prime firsts at 45 cents. The shortage in butter applies only to fancy stock with ordinary grades still sufficient.

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 25.—The country dressed veal market is slow and weak. Fancy calves are bought at 16 cents and most of the trade is opposed to buying over 15 cents. Choice light hogs are about steady at 15 to 16 cents. Receipts of good hogs light.

The live poultry market is slow and inactive. Supplies are plentiful with buying and selling prices generally unchanged.

More Roseburg heneocell is on the local market but the quality so far is only fair. Fancy stuff brings around \$2 a crate.

Hot house rhubarb and cucumbers are very firm with prices at almost prohibitive.

The onion market is quiet at prevailing levels with little shipping being done at the moment.

## SHORTAGE OF \$5000 LAID TO CASHIER

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 25.—Shortage of \$5,000 in the state's funds, discovered by a check after State Treasurer T. B. Kay took office the first of the year, was confessed by Clarence W. Thompson, cashier in the state treasury under Treasurers Hoff and Jefferson Myers. Mr. Kay announced today, Thompson, is at present calendar clerk in the house of representatives, has been given a few days in which to make good the amount of his surety, the Fidelity and Deposit Company of Maryland, and Mr. Kay said that he heard today that the amount of the shortage may be returned to the state by Thompson. No formal charges have been lodged against Thompson.

Treasurer Kay said the defalcations had covered a period of about four years. Small amounts were taken at a time.

Thompson was uncommunicative when asked for a statement today.

The newspapers have tried to get me in bad," said Thompson, and I have nothing whatever to say. I am here and I expect to stay here."
