## MEDICAL STUDENT STARTS LONG DIET

(Associated Press Local Wire.)  
CHICAGO, Feb. 25.—Harold G. O. Holck, a 25-year-old medical student of the University of Chicago, starts today on a fasting diet that will last for two years. The object is to determine just how much food is needed for keen thinking. He will eat only when hungry, and will eat very little, measuring and weighing every bit taken. During the period, mental tests will be given him, including mathematics, puzzles and typewriting exercises. For the last two years he has carried a scale with him to determine the amount of food he consumes normally. The mental tests showed his normal efficiency. At the end of two years the results will be tabulated and psychology experts expect to work out from them an ideal human ration.

## LARGE NUMBER OF BONUSES GRANTED

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25.—Major-General Robert C. Davis in charge of the war department's administration of the adjusted compensation act, announced today that 2,400,000 bonus applications had been received from the veterans throughout the United States and those residing in foreign countries. Of the total number received, he said, only 27,000 applications had been disallowed by the department, but it has been necessary to return 500,000 to the senders for corrections and necessary information.

## FIFTEEN CENTURY CHURCH IS BURNED

MORIAIX, France, Feb. 25.—Fire destroyed the fifteenth century church of St. Jean of Du Douit, near here, one of the most famous shrines in Brittany, during a storm yesterday.

Lightning struck and set fire to an adjoining house, even flames ignited the steeple. Efforts of villagers to save the church were fruitless and many wept as they saw the church consumed. The famous reliquary containing a figure of John the Baptist which drew pilgrims from all Brittany, was saved, as were the ancient sacred vessels.

## EIGHT KILLED IN A BIG EXPLOSION

(Associated Press Local Wire.)  
LANGRYS, Tex., Feb. 25.—A premature explosion of dynamite at the Southern Pacific railway rock quarry here yesterday caused the death of eight men and injuries to several others. So powerful was the blast that the bodies of some of the victims were torn to bits, while others were hurled hundreds of feet through the air. The dead include John W. Harshaw of El Paso, division engineer for the railroad, who saw service at Dunsuir, Cal., Portland, Ore., Onden, Utah and El Paso. He was an expert at handling explosives and had made a special trip to Langrys to supervise some extensive blasting that was to be done.

## YOUNG JAKE SETS BILLIARD RECORD

CHICAGO, Feb. 25.—Jake Schaefer, who once defeated Willie Hoppe for the 18.2 ballkine billiard title which Hoppe is defending in the international tournament here, today defeated Horreman's Belgian champion 400 to 161 in the third match of the cue meet last night. Young Jake made a new high mark for the meet with a run of 130, and finished in the tenth frame with an average of 49. Horreman's best was a 67, an average of 17.59. Hoppe engaged Walker Cochran of Hollywood, Cal., who lost 400 to 347 to Erich Hansenbacher, German champion yesterday and Horreman's plays Kamakichi Suzuki, the Japanese, defeated by Hoppe in the opener in today's matches, both at 400 points.

## MARINES BOARD A SHIP; SEIZE BOOZE

NORFOLK, Va., Feb. 25.—A raiding party of marines boarded the navy transport Beaufort when she docked here last night from the West Indies and seized several hundred gallons of liquor. Some of the liquor, the raiders said, was taken from the state rooms of officers ranging in rank from pay clerks to lieutenants. The raid was conducted under direction of Captain Wilbur Smith, assistant commandant of the naval base here. Orders for the action were issued by Rear-Admiral Roger Welles, commandant of the fifth naval district. Violations of the law as well as navy regulations apparently are involved in the case of the navy transport Beaufort which transported liquor into Hampton Roads, it was pointed out here today by government officials. It was said that those found guilty might be tried either by a federal court for violating the prohibition laws or by court martial.
