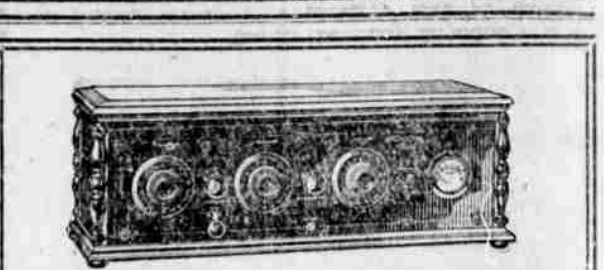

A WORD FOR BEGINNERS.

The best way to solve a cross-word puzzle is to run quickly over the list of horizontal and vertical synonyms and compare them to the spaces in the puzzle extending cross-wise or down-wise from the number of the synonym. Some words which will not fit in the number of spaces available will quickly occur to you in some instances, giving you a few starting points from which to solve the more difficult words. The words must interlock perfectly.
