AGRICULTURE CO-OPERATIVE BILL IS PASSED

Dickinson Measure Accepted by the House Over the Haugen Plan.

VOTE IS 284 TO 95

Haugen Says Substitute Bill Would Nullify Conference Recommendation.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, Feb. 26.—By a vote of 284 to 95 the Dickinson co-operative marketing bill was passed today by the house. The measure approved as a substitute for the Haugen proposal reported by the agricultural committee as a bill carrying out the recommendations of the president's agricultural commission now goes to the senate with its fate problematical. Mr. Dickinson, predicting enactment of the measure into law, said he had assurance that Senator McNary, republican, Oregon, would lead a fight for favorable senate action and that Chairman Norris of the senate agriculture committee was not inclined to be hostile to it.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26.—By a roll call vote of 293 to 175 the house today approved the Dickinson co-operative marketing bill as a house bill for the Haugen measure reported by the agricultural committee. After the house bill had been approved another roll call was taken on final passage of the bill.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26.—A second and final vote was in order in the house today on adoption of the bill substituted yesterday for the Capper-Haugen measure drafted by the agricultural committee to carry out the co-operative marketing recommendations of the president's agriculture conference. The substitute measure was offered by Representative Dickinson, republican, Iowa, a leader of the farm bloc who said his bill also was designed to embody the conference suggestions on co-operative marketing. Chairman Haugen, of the agriculture committee predicted the Dickinson substitute would prevail today, pointing out that its adoption yesterday was brought about by a coalition of democrats or insurgents who he said would support it in a record vote. The substitute measure which Mr. Haugen declared would nullify the conference recommendations of the subject differs from the Capper-Haugen bill principally by eliminating the requirement for government auditing, licensing and regulation. As approved yesterday, the Dickinson proposal also carries an amendment increasing applications for the department of agriculture and broadening its scope of activities under the Capper-Volstead act.

(Continued from page 1.) mitted fought the proposition, thereby leaving the bill to the governor. Following the chief executive's message to this house this morning, Representative Gordon moved for recalling the bill from the governor in order that the house might reconsider it. The move was sharply opposed by Representative Swan, Linn county, but carried. The bill was sent on the table for final disposition this afternoon. Representative Coffey, a member of the house roads and highways committee, who has consistently fought against putting excessive rates into the measure, pointed out that all the work of the committees of the two houses would have gone for nothing if the bill with its present rates were vetoed. Representative Shelton, of Baker, attempted to block reconsideration of the measure by moving that the house reconsider its action in recalling the bill, thereby sending it back to the governor unchanged. His motion lost that the speaker Burdick took the floor to urge reconsideration. "The governor's message serves notice that he will veto the bill in its present form," he explained. Representative Graham emphasized the importance of establishing the principles laid down in the bill and pleaded against sacrificing it by leaving excessive rates in it. The house concurred in a conference committee report establishing an extra fee of 50 percent above regular charges on vehicles operated for commercial profit five miles beyond the corporate limits of any city. The measure will tax peddlers, bakers, butchers and others' machines operating from cities out
