at Napa, Calif., will be pressed it was said today at the navy department if Kennedy is found to be sane.

It was explained that the officer was tried before a summary court at his Asiatic station on charges based on drunkenness and insubordination but both Rear-Admiral Washington, commanding and Secretary Wilbur were of the opinion that the punishment, a suspension, was too lenient. Steps to order a court martial were in progress, it was said, when Kennedy was committed to the asylum.

Details of the incidents which led up to the charges against Lieutenant Kennedy have not been made public, but it was at the department that in one report from him, he had mentioned the automobile incident, naming Lieutenant Christie, Kennedy's immediate commanding officer at the time.

The report of the naval medical survey on which Lieutenant Kennedy was committed to the insane asylum, has not been received by the bureau of medicine and surgery at the navy department. The bureau was said to have acted on telegraphic advice in approving the report of the survey board.

according to the police. He said he could offer no motive for the murder plot.

The arrest of the millionaire plotter is expected today. He is believed to be in San Francisco. "Lou" who is also known as "Russian Lou" admitted his part in the plot detailed by King, but also denied all knowledge of the poisoned milk. He suggested that it might have been a supplementary plot to "back up" the gun plot in the event that the gunmen did not go through with their work.

"I did not intend to kill anybody," Lou said, according to the police. I was going to take the money and then forget about the killing. That is just what I did."

The police said that they had evidence that the money was passed to the gunmen in the presence of three witnesses, one of them a taxicab driver who aided in the introduction of King to the gunmen. Certain of these witnesses expected to "high-jack" the money from the gunmen and followed their taxicab in another car for this purpose. The murder conspirators were soon lost in a traffic jam, however, and escaped.

Later the police said that "Lou's" full name was Lou Madison. Both Madison and King were permitted to talk freely to newspapermen.

King said that he first met the millionaire about nine months ago at a Hawaiian party in Lake Port. They were introduced by mutual friends. They met often thereafter, and last September the millionaire asked King if he would undertake to "get rid of" Mrs. Hotelling. King said that he agreed for the consideration named. The millionaire told him, King said, that he did desire any other member of the family harmed, but that Mrs. Hotelling had once set a number of ruffians on his trail to "beat him up," for an imagined offense and he wanted to settle the score with her.

Madison together with "Al" whose last name is not known to the police, were given \$2,500 by King according to Madison's story, after a number of meetings in the millionaire's home here to perfect the plot details.

They had no intention of going through with the plot, however, Madison said, departing for Los Angeles with the money after the first of the year. They returned to San Francisco but two weeks ago. King said that he was at one time jailer at Hills, and married the daughter of Sheriff Pua there.

According to the police the ramifications of the plot finally culminated in the death of Mrs. Hotelling and possibly the aged mother, Mrs. Lavina J. Hotelling.

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 25.—Announcement was made today that the deal whereby R. P.
