AUTO LIGHTING SYSTEM WILL BE CHANGED BY LAW

Oregon Adopts Plan Used By All States Along the Coast.

TO BE NO DIMMING

Headlights, Spotlights, Fog Lights and Signal Lights Affected by Law.

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 28.—Reform in the motor vehicle lighting system of Oregon is provided in house bill 264, by Shrock, which passed the legislature and which will become effective at midnight August 31.

The new system is now used in California and Idaho and is being adopted by Washington.

The position of head lamps is fixed at not less than 24 or more than 50 inches above the surface of the highway and the act provides that it be impossible to move them so the beam of light can be raised above the center of the lamp.

The act provides for adjustment stations. Any garage or shop which will provide itself with the necessary equipment may make application to the secretary of state for a certificate as an adjusting station.

The act requires the adoption of certain lenses and reflector devices. At present there are 27 different makes of lenses and reflectors that meet requirements in the states that have the law.

The cost of the lenses range from 30 cents a pair to \$3 or \$4. To determine what lenses shall be used in Oregon manufacturers will be required to submit to the secretary of state their particular lenses, with descriptions and instructions as to how they are to be applied.

The act will allow of only one spotlight on a car. It must be on the left side with the beam directed to the right side of the road. It must be stationary so that it can be shifted only with the use of tools.

A fog light is defined in the act as a light which must be on the left of the axle or less than 24 or more than 36 inches above the surface of the highway.

The act provides that signal lights may be used on motor buses, but they must be of uniform color.

Under the new act headlights must be dimmed when the car meets another car on a wet hard surface highway. The new standard of lights does not require dimming under other conditions.

The cost of adjusting lights to conform to the act is provided in the act and is fixed at a minimum of 75 cents.

The act makes it unlawful to possess or sell cars not equipped with the lawful devices.

PORTLAND MARKET QUIET

Week-end trading in local produce markets was quiet with little change shown in most lines. In the dairy lists butter and cheese prices held steady at current levels, although the butter continues to display a firm undertone due to the shortage. Bids on the exchange were steady at 46 1/2 cents on extra cubes and 46 cents on standards.

Egg values ranged a point lower at the close on extras, firsts and pullets at 31 cents, 30 cents and 29 cents respectively. Current receipts held steady at the 27 cent net price. Country dressed meat receipts were light today with the demand quiet. Veal was weak at the close with tops offered at 15 to 15 1/2 cents, lower prices were expected during the coming week. Choice light hogs were scarce at 16 to 16 1/2 cents. The poultry market was quiet at the close and the market was inclined to drag on both live and dressed stock.

TRACK SEASON NEARS

EUGENE, Ore., Feb. 28.—University of Oregon will open its 1925 track season on April 11 against Stanford University at Palo Alto, Calif. Prospects for Oregon are not bright.

The Oregon team, which won the coast championship last year is rounding into shape very slowly, according to Coach "Bill" Hayward, who believes that the squad will not be at its best until May. Six lettermen are eligible for the varsity squad this year. They are Kinney and Ager in the 440-yard dash; Kelsey in the broad jump; Eby in the high jump; Eby in the pole vault and javelin.

CHARGES DISMISSED

YREKA, Cal., Feb. 28.—Two Oregon men under cover of prohibition agents, left here hurriedly this morning for their homes in Klamath Falls following dismissal of a charge of an attempt to commit murder against George Pappas in which the two agents appeared as witnesses.

Pappas engaged in a gun battle with the prohibition agents last November when, according to Pappas, they forced an entrance to his home while a dinner party was in progress. Pappas testified he thought at the time that the two were highwaymen.
