KITCHEN CUPBOARD

Winter Desserts

THIS is the season of the year when rich puddings of various kinds are enjoyed.

Baked Indian Pudding.—Take two quarts of milk, three-fourths of a cupful of corn meal, two well-beaten eggs, one cupful of brown sugar, one cupful of chopped suet, one-half cupful each of raisins and dates or prunes and figs, spices to taste and one cupful of sour cream. Scald one quart of the milk with the corn meal, cook ten minutes, then add the rest of the milk, the beaten eggs, sugar and suet and spice, with the fruit. Stir a layer of flour over the top, after adding the sour cream, and stir often during the first hour of baking, then let the flour form a crust over the top with the suet. Bake for four hours in a moderate oven.

Steamed Delight.—Take two cupfuls of bread crumbs, one cupful of molasses, one cupful of milk, one-half teaspoonful each of cloves and cinnamon, one teaspoonful of mace, one cupful each of raisins and currants. Steam three hours; serve with canned fruit juice for sauce, or with:

Orange Sauce.—Cream five tablespoons of butter with one-half cupful of sugar. Put into a saucepan over hot water and add one-half cupful of boiling water. Beat in the stiffly beaten whites of three eggs, add the juice of two oranges and one and one-half teaspoonfuls of lemon juice. Continue heating until light and foamy.

Raisin Pie.—Line pie plate with pastry and fill with the following: To one cupful of raisins add the grated rind and juice of one lemon; beat two egg yolks and mix with one-half cupful of sugar and one cupful of any strained fruit juice, a pinch of salt and two tablespoonfuls of cream. Cover with a crust and bake in a moderate oven forty minutes.

Cheese Salad.—Take two cupfuls of cottage cheese, add one teaspoonful of salt, one-half cupful of raisins, chopped, four tablespoonfuls of cream, make into small flat cakes by molding in a tablespoon. Cut each cake put a thin slice of cube of jelly and garnish with citron cut into fancy shapes.

Once Populous Cities Reclaimed by Jungle

The old question whether a thing can be lost when you know where it is applies in part to lost cities, because the sites of many of them are known and in some cases even the buildings and statuary are almost intact.

Now, however, their only inhabitants are the beasts of the jungle. Lions prow through their echoing halls, monkeys race across their fretted arches and snakes lurk in their dark dungeons or glide across their crumbling pavements.

For instance, the holy city of the Buddhists—Barabodier, in Java—had been forgotten for 600 years when Sir Stamford Raffles rediscovered it and its wonderful temple, covered it and its wonderful temple, the eighth wonder of the world, says a writer in London Answers.

The jungle of Siam has hidden its ancient capital, Ayutthia, for four centuries. Its inhabitants fled before the conquering Burmese, and never returned. It is now said to be the largest place of thousands of enormous snakes.

Mystery surrounds the dead city of Tibet, which Captain Rawling discovered. It is a vast collection of palaces, monasteries and dwelling houses, but the Tibetan's professional ignorance of its existence, and also of the reason of its abandonment.

Five centuries ago Angkor had a population of three-quarters of a million. Today it is the dead city of Cambodia. The carved stone elephants, the immense causeways, the majestic temples, still remain, but the jungle has invaded the streets and squares.

MARKETS

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 2.—Just now the sluggish condition of coast potato markets is causing some anxiety among growers and dealers alike. The movement is stagnant and has been for the past month. Buying prices are nominal at \$1.50 to \$1.60 in the country for good Oregon Burbanks.

Demand for seed potatoes is disappointing. Some have ascribed the lack of demand to the heavy rains in sections in California that ordinarily use Oregon seed potatoes and others to a lack of ability of southern growers to finance a coming crop.

In a carefully prepared price chart, H. L. Hinger, local representative of the bureau of agricultural economics, shows that the present slump is not abnormal and that the price rushed to a peak three weeks earlier than last year. There was practically no market for Oregon stock this year until the first part of January.

Analysis of price fluctuations in the government chart shows that values were definitely established at \$1.75 per bushel by January 20, while competitive buying forced the market to \$2 by February 1. Since then there has been no buying to speak of and the market has eased back to \$1.50 and \$1.60.

Oregon shipped 72 cars from February 1 to February 25, as compared with 160 cars shipped during the same period last year. Oregon has now shipped a total of 619 cars as compared to 832 cars up to the same time in 1924.

Potato holdings in the whole country on January 1 this year were 16,000,000 bushels larger than a year ago. The situation is generally bearish.

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 2.—Egg storage has assumed larger proportions in the local market with considerable interest shown in processed stocks. Receipts are not heavy but of better quality due to improved weather conditions. Values opened around steady.

Butter opened strong with supplies still scarce. Arrivals of country dressed meats were light today with a brisk call for choice light hogs. Top pork is firm at 15¢ cents. Demand for veal was not so keen and the market held steady at 15 to 15½ cents.

Live poultry receipts were moderate with quotations nominal at Saturday's close.

Produce trading in fruits and vegetables opened slow with supplies plentiful.

The apple movement is sluggish with dealers much concerned over high priced stock held in storage. The demand now is for cookers or other cheap stocks.

BATTLE FLEET WILL MANEUVER FOR TWO MONTHS
(Continued from page 1.)

moves offshore in the role of an enemy fleet. It has become the "black fleet" and its mission is to invade the Pacific coast and establish a base of operations as the first move in a war against the United States.

For the purpose of this problem the strategic base point where this mission seeks has been set in the Pacific ocean at a point off the coast of lower California. The "black fleet's" function is to convey a great train of supply ships in order to capture this point and establish therein a stronghold for operations against the United States.

The backbone of the navy's major power, nine great battleships, form the striking power of the "black fleet." These first line dreadnaughts are supported by thirty destroyers under the flag of a first line cruiser, the Omaha, three aircraft tenders and nine of the slow moving train of supply ships.

This "black fleet" will move out into the Pacific ocean to the west, in order to assume the position of a fleet invading the Pacific coast. Then it will in battle formation strike eastward for the point designated in the problem as the objective base.

Meanwhile the defensive force of the Pacific, the scouting fleet which has come from its Atlantic station, is wheeling into position from the Panama Canal with orders to seek out and destroy the "black fleet." It is known as the "blue fleet." There is some fifty eight craft in this defense fleet with first line strength resting in high speed first line cruisers.
