WILL BUILD A DAM ACROSS THE COLUMBIA

(Associated Press Local Wire.) WASHINGTON, Mar. 2.—The Washington Irrigation and Development company of Seattle was granted a license today by the Federal Power committee to construct a dam 2 1/2 miles long across the Columbia river at Priest Rapids. The project provides for a reservoir of 85,000 acre feet and the initial installation of power units capable of an output of 240,000 horse power. Eventually, it is hoped to turn out 750,000 horse power from the project.

SEATTLE, Mar. 2.—Early beginning of construction on a project including a city of 50,000 where sage brush stands now was forecast here today when receipt of a dispatch from Washington. The dispatch related the federal water power commission had given the Washington irrigations and development company of Seattle a license to construct a dam across the Columbia river at Priest Rapids.

Intention to build the project was announced five years ago. Granting of a permit awaited experiments to devise apparatus by which salmon can go up the river past the dam to spawn.

The dam, which it has been said will be the longest in the world, has been promised to cost \$28,000,000, and the interests back of it have stated that they will use \$11,000,000 more to install electrical machinery, \$20,000,000 to build factories and shops at a city to be created at Priest Rapids, and \$12,000,000 in other buildings for the city. A feature of the project is irrigation of 100,000 acres of fertile but barren land in the basin of the Columbia River.

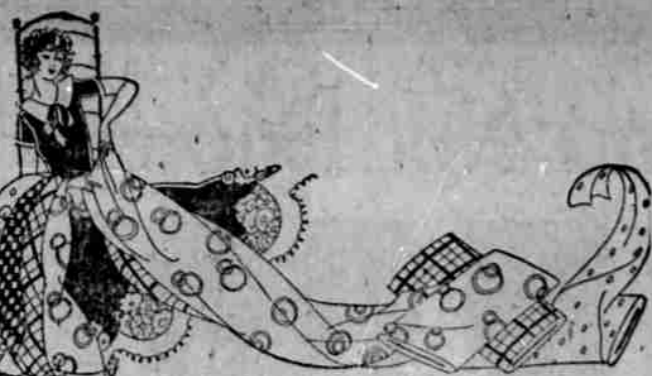
