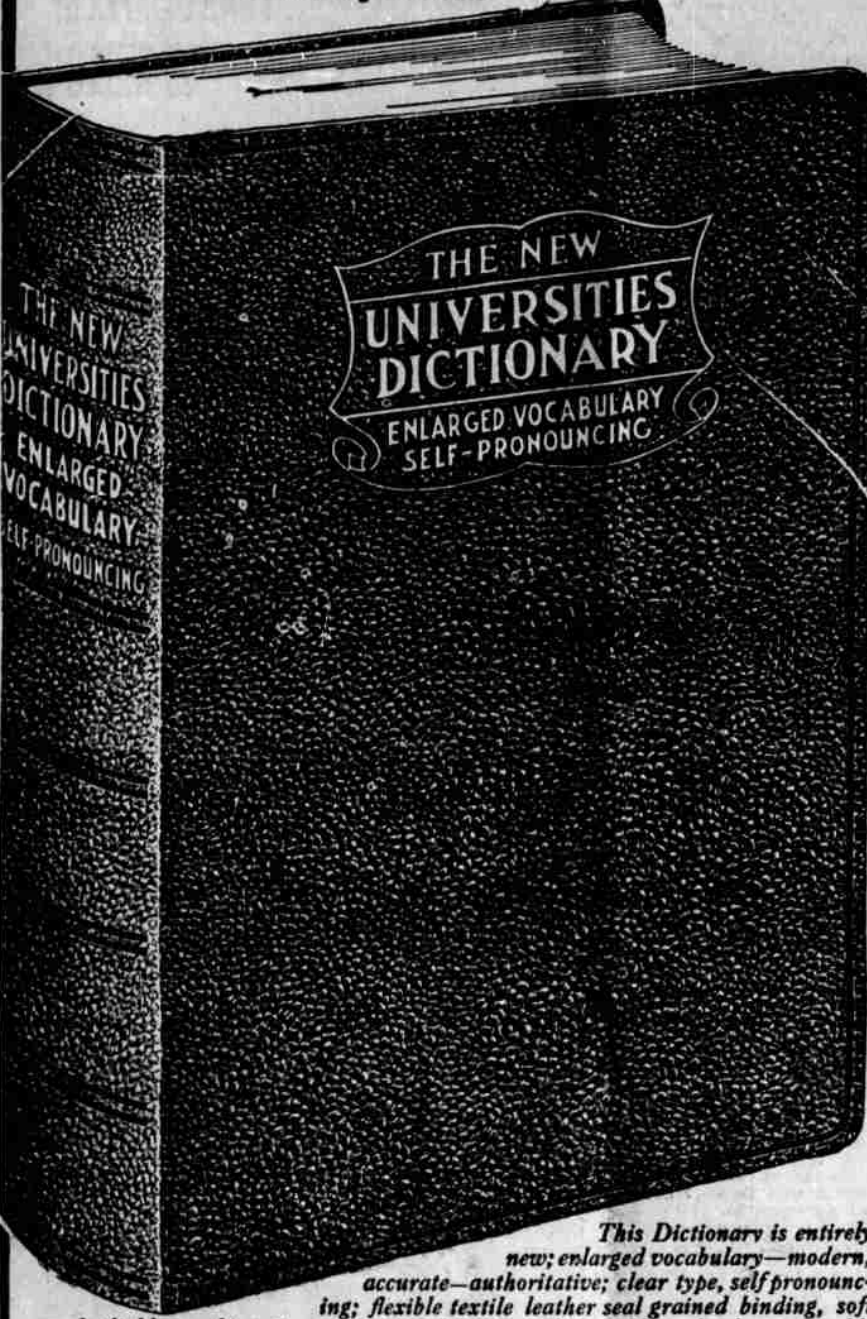

How to Talk

The publishers have asked me to supply a series of easy-to-read talks on our modern language. "Talks on Talking," might be the proper term, for I shall endeavor to set forth some of the needs for improvement in our daily conversation. There is a right and a wrong way to do almost everything. And strange as it may seem, the right way usually is as easy as the wrong way. The correct use of words is not difficult. The trouble lies in starting wrong. Our elders should have taught us to speak correctly from childhood—they should have recognized the advantages of correct expression of thought. But here we are, practicing the same errors with children. We teach them good morals, but poor use of words is disregarded. They are taught not to use bad words, but seldom are they cautioned against using bad grammar. Of course I refer to home training—to starting the child right when first it begins to learn to form words into sentences. How easy it would be to learn to speak correctly at that age! And again, the wrong way is no easier than the right way. Then, why should not the child be taught correctly at the start? Carelessness on the part of the parents is the answer—plain carelessness, for which there is no excuse. Before the day of the dictionary—when educational advantages were few—before the advent of the university—little blame could be attached to those that did not speak correctly. But today is entirely different. Here are daily newspapers, which in themselves are examples of the advancement in modern English. COMMITTEE ON RAW PRODUCTS MAKES REPORT
MAGNS ATTENTION
A special communication of Laurel Lodge No. 13, will be held in the Masonic Temple Wednesday evening, March 4th. Work in E. A. degree. By order of W. M. W. F. HARRIS, Secty.
That the raw products committee of the chamber of commerce is functioning along the right lines was again proven yesterday afternoon at a meeting of the committee, all members being present except one. Mr. Cooney reported that he had made request to the federal authorities to make a soil survey of this county, and that he felt he could report progress on the matter, as he had been assured of cooperation of members of the Oregon delegation in congress. He also reported progress on the arrangements to hold a county-wide agricultural conference in this city during the home products show in September. He suggested that all civic bodies and other interested organizations in the county be asked to send delegates to a proposed preliminary meeting to be held in this city the latter part of May, to make arrangements for the conference, and be instructed as to their work in connection with the event. It was decided by the committee that the poultry and sheep raising industry be stressed this coming year in the county, as it is felt that both of these industries could well be increased with profit to the ranchers. The reports of Messrs. Butner and Brand as to the findings of their sub-committees were read and ordered placed on file in the Chamber of Commerce for the guidance of new settlers. The matter of a larger acreage of strawberries of the varieties that lend themselves to canning and barrelling was taken up and discussed. It is thought that a campaign of education should be put on to increase the acreage of this valuable small fruit, as there is a good market for this product. After a general discussion the committee adjourned.

FEBRUARY PROVED NORMAL MONTH
The month of February was warmer than average and slightly over the usual month in rainfall, according to the monthly report filed by William Bell, meteorologist. The average daily temperature for the month was 48 degrees, as compared with a normal of 43.4 degrees. In precipitation the month was just about one-half inch above normal, the total rainfall being 5.05 inches, while the normal is 4.56 inches. For the season, from September 1, the rainfall now exceeds the normal 9.03 inches, the total rainfall to date being 33.23 inches. The average wind velocity for the month gave an hourly velocity of 3.3 miles per hour, the hardest wind for a period of 5 minutes being 26 miles per hour.

GIVES COOLIDGE A BURIAL GROUND
(LANCASTER, O., Mar. 4.—) When President Coolidge is inaugurated he will become the owner of a one-acre tract of land lying west of this city, which he may use for his burial ground only. According to court records here, this tract, known as the "president's acre" was deeded 100 years ago to President Andrew Jackson and to his successors in office to be used as their burial ground. Mr. Coolidge will be the twenty-fourth president to be notified of this privilege on his inauguration day. The burial ground is surrounded by a stone wall three feet thick and ten feet high. An inscription chiseled over the arched gateway tells of the purpose for which the land was intended. The donor died in 1833 after planting the tract with locust trees and cedar of Lebanon brought from the Holy land. These were destroyed in a tornado here years ago.
LONDON TIMES IS PRAISING COOLIDGE
(LONDON, Mar. 4.—) The Times today gives over considerable space to cable details of the inauguration program in Washington and to an eulogistic biographical sketch of President Coolidge. Editorially the paper says: "It is indeed significant that the man now elected as its head by a nation so eagerly conscious of its growing power strongly and repeatedly emphasizes the idea of disarmament. Under Mr. Coolidge's leadership that power will surely be used as a factor of peace."
