ELEVEN CARLOADS BROCCOLI SHIPPED

Eleven carloads of broccoli have been shipped out of Douglas county up to the present time, and the season's estimate is now placed at about 35 carloads.

Ten carloads have been shipped out of Riddle, and one out of Roseburg. Riddle is now shipping out one or two carloads every day, and will continue at about that rate until the end of the season.

The Riddle broccoli is of excellent quality, and is running 75 per cent number ones, which means 12 heads or less to the crate. Other points in the county are shipping out in small express lots, or by truck load as there is not enough to make up carload shipments.
