"The question of my re-appointment as assistant chief of the air service," he said, "is a small matter. The question of reorganizing our system of national defense is a very big matter. The people must decide what our national defense should be and to arrive at a conclusion they must know and be told the truth about what we have, what we need, and how it should be handled."

NORFOLK, Va., March 5.—Brigadier-General Mitchell, who shown dispatches today telling of the appointment of Colonel J. E. Fechet as his successor, said: "He is a good man. I shall abide by the department's orders."

LONDON CRITICAL OF COOLIDGE'S SPEECH

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) LONDON, March 6.—Quoting from President Coolidge's inaugural address the statement that America "cherished no purpose save the merit of 'Almighty God' and that the legions she sends forth are armed, 'not with the sword, but with the cross,'" the Morning Post says: "It is good to know the Americans feel that way, but it might be dangerous to presume too much on their Christian self denial."

Comparing the president's peaceful intentions with his advocacy of a strong defense force, the paper adds: "When Mr. Coolidge tells us he is looking for a formula for permanent peace he indicates that he is in no great hopes of finding one and that until he does he proposes to admit that the old game is still strong in mankind."

(Continued from page 1.) a cylindrical record. In this way, each minute portion of the picture in turn affects the intensity of the light reaching the photoelectric cell. This variation in the amount of light striking the sensitive surface of the cell gives rise to a current which, through the agency of a vacuum tube amplifier and modulator, controls the current flowing through the telephone line.

At the receiving end an unexposed photographic film is rotated under a beam of light in a manner similar to that at the transmitting

end. The two films are caused to rotate at exactly the same speed and by means of a new device known as a light valve, the amount of light reaching the film at the receiving end, is identical with that at the sending end control.

Regarding the use of their system, the officials of the American Telephone and Telegraph company announce that the extent to which it is installed on their various long distance lines will depend entirely upon the demand which arises for this type of service. As has been demonstrated in previous tests, the system is also applicable to radio transmission of pictures when atmospheric conditions are such that steadiness of transmission and freedom from interference can be assured.

SUES FOR MONEY SHE LOANED HUSBY

LONDON, Mar. 6.—The friendship that once existed between the former Countess Carnarvon and Mrs. Dorothy Muriel Dennistoun was dwelt upon today when Mrs. Dennistoun was again subjected to cross-examination in the trial of her suit against her former husband, Lieutenant-Colonel Ian Oswald, Dennistoun, present husband of the former Countess, for money she alleges she had loaned him prior to their divorce. The plaintiff declared the countless givings to her "an enormous quantity of clothes," and was "marvelously kind," during the two years she was on terms of greatest friendship with the late Earl of Carnarvon discoverer of the tomb of King Tut-Ankh-Amen, and his wife.

Questioned whether in view of the fact that she had previously testified she had told Lady Carnarvon "everything," she revealed to her the fact that Colonel Dennistoun was the "man" who sold her to General Cowans. The witness said she had never discussed the subject with the countess. The question had reference to Mrs. Dennistoun's allegations that her intimacy with the late Sir John Steven Cowans, Great Britain quartermaster, had been encouraged by her husband because of his ambition for military advancement.

ALLEGED INSANE MAN WILL BE TRANSFERRED

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, March 6.—Lieutenant Frank E. Kennedy, U. S. N., whose detention at the state insane asylum, Nash, Cal., has led to legal proceedings, has been ordered transferred to Washington for observation by naval medical authorities here.

The order was issued today after Secretary Wilbur had received a negative reply to a suggestion to the navy doctors at Mare Island navy yard that Lieutenant Kennedy might recover his mental balance if restored to duty and granted leave in order that he might have the care of his wife and relatives.

They were brought to Roseburg and arraigned before Justice of the Peace George Jones who placed them each under \$150 bail, and as they were unable to pay the amount, they will be confined to jail until their trial can be held.
