## NEWS OF MAUD IS NOT DEFINITE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) SEATTLE, Wash., March 6.—Opinion among persons familiar with the north varied here today as the meaning of a cablegram received last night by The Associated Press from Nome, Alaska, concerning the Maud exploration ship of Captain Ronald Amundsen. The Maud left Seattle Jan. 7, 1922, to drift across the north pole, and November 12 was among the new Siberian Islands, a little way north to the middle of the Arctic coast of Siberia.

The cablegram read: "Only communication from the Maud is through Stavanger radio, Norway. If ice conditions favorable Maud refuel from Soviet vessel next summer. Possibly return Nome about middle August."

Most of these familiar with the matters concerning this message were of the opinion that it simply meant that Nome had no communication with the Maud except such as might reach Nome via Europe and the American states through a radio at Stavanger which is at the South end of Norway.

## STAY OF SENTENCE IS GRANTED FORBES.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) CHICAGO, March 6.—Application for a writ of error on behalf of Colonel Charles R. Forbes, former head of the United States veteran's bureau, recently found guilty with John W. Thompson of conspiracy was filed in federal court today.

Forbes counsel seeks to appeal the case to the United States circuit court of appeals.

Stay of sentence of Forbes, who like Thompson was fined \$10,000 and sentenced to prison for two years, was extended for 40 days by Judge Samuel A. Alschuler of the circuit court of appeals, but he refused to pass on the application for a writ of error and supersedeas in the absence of the trial judge, George A. Carpenter, who sentenced Forbes and Thompson.
