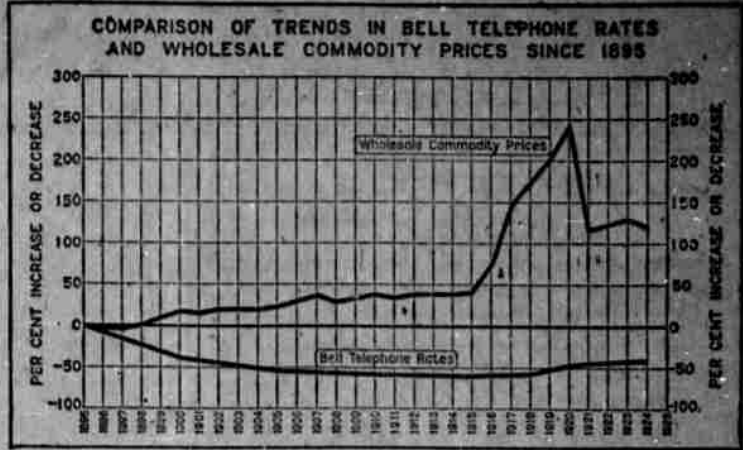
FOUR PERSONS ARE BURNED TO DEATH (Associated Press Leased Wire.) LA GRANDE, Ore., Mar. 7.—Four persons were burned to death and two others were severely burned early today when the home of Walter Schultz in Evans, 55 miles northeast of here was destroyed by fire.

The dead are: Mrs. Walter Schultz, her son Jimmy, aged 4 years, her daughter Florence, aged 2 and her six months old baby. Schultz and a brother-in-law, Ted Frost, 16, were seriously burned. Physicians said it might be necessary to amputate Frost's hands, but that both men have chances for recovery.

The flames were caused by a kerosene explosion when Schultz started a fire in the room occupied by Mrs. Schultz and her children. The house was completely destroyed. Schultz was employed by the O. W. R. & N. as a section hand.
