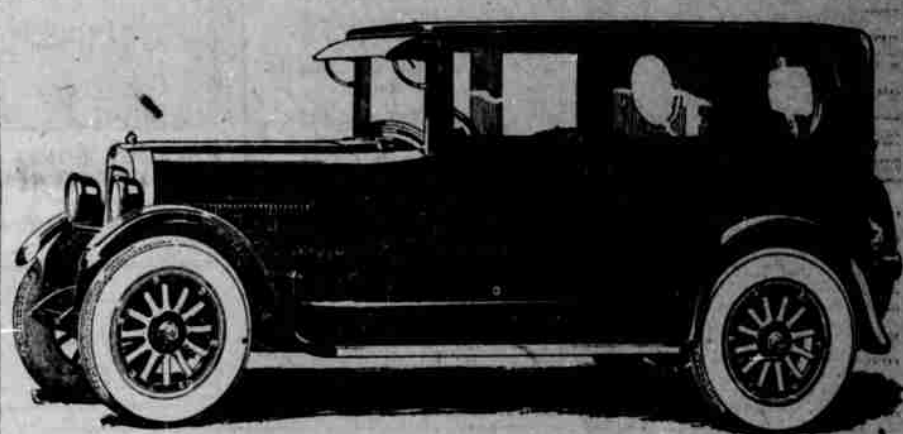
Leaves For Grants Pass—
