AUTO THEFT LAW IS PRONOUNCED VALID

WASHINGTON, March 9.—The national motor vehicle theft act was declared valid and constitutional today by the supreme court. The court also held that in seeking convictions under the act, it was not necessary to prove that the person prosecuted knew he had come into the possession of stolen motor car.

A supreme court review was granted today in a case, in which the validity of the Alaska law taxing the salmon canning industry, was challenged by the Pacific American Fisheries company.

PUMPER REPAIRED

Repairs to the city's big fire engine, which was damaged Friday night on East Lane street, were completed yesterday. Mechanics Fulton and Crawford arrived yesterday morning at 9:55 o'clock, and went to work immediately, getting the machine in operation again at 9 o'clock in the evening.

With her 14 inch gun she will fire 1400-pound projectiles over the mountainous Santa Barbara Island, forty miles southwest of here, in an attempt to hit a moving target on the other side. Her two small fighting planes, launched from her decks at sea, will fly above the mountain and give her gunners the range of the hidden target twenty miles away.

AMERICAN BATTLE FLEETS MANEUVER IN MIMIC WARFARE

ABOARD U. S. S. SEATTLE, at Sea, off the west coast of Mexico, March 9.—Today two great battle fleets, involving one hundred and nine war vessels of the American navy, are in the zone of possible combat in a great war game.

The great black fleet of 57 vessels, the main defense of which is nine dreadnaughts, one cruiser, 29 destroyers, aircraft and nine sweepers, is a vastly superior enemy. Its mission is the "invasion" of the Pacific Coast. Whether it is to shell cities or establish a base of operations is a question for the defensive blue force to determine.

Today real action starts in scouting work and preparation for battle by the new scout cruisers and the "S" type submarines. It is the first time that the new cruisers and the new type submarines have been engaged in maneuvers and naval experts are watching their work with keen

interest. There are eight of the new cruisers with the blue fleet and one with the black forces. These cruisers are the fastest American war craft afloat, being capable of scouting 35 knots an hour. These maneuvers off the coast of lower California are participated in by 24,844 officers and men. Sixteen thousand three hundred ninety six of these are in the invading fleet and 8,448 are with the defensive blue fleet.

RAILROADS AGAIN ARGUE RATE CUT

SALEM, Ore., March 9.—Circuit Judges Kelly and McMahon today are hearing arguments on the appeal taken by the O. W. R. & N. and Southern Pacific companies from an order of the public service commission decreasing the rates on various farm products inside the state from 10 to 20 per cent. Circuit Judge Bingham heard arguments in the case several months ago and remanded the hearing to the commission for further testimony. The death of Judge Bingham in the meantime caused the re-arguments which are now being heard.

2 YEARS FOR BLACKMAILER

LONDON, Mar. 9.—William Cooper Hobbs, a solicitor's clerk, who was tried on the charge of accepting checks for 150,000 pounds in connection with a blackmailing plot against Sir Hari Singh, an East Indian Prince, was found guilty today and sentenced to two years at hard labor.

CHICAGO, March 9.—Cross-examination of W. E. D. Stokes, millionaire hotel owner, continued today, his fourth on the witness stand, in his trial with Robert E. Lee, Chicago negro, for conspiracy to defame his wife, Mrs. Helen Elwood, Stokes of Denver.
