SENATE RENEWS WRANGLE OVER WARREN'S NAME

(Continued from page 1.)

"About that time the American Sugar Refining company, or persons connected with the corporation, began buying stock in some or all of these Michigan corporations. Mr. Warren acted as an attorney for these buyers, passing upon the validity of stocks being purchased."

"A part, and I think it may fairly be said, a large part of the stock so purchased, was issued or transferred to Warren and he in turn endorsed it in blank for delivery to the purchasers."

"This operation continued for about four years until the American Sugar Refining Company or persons connected with that company, notably H. O. Havemeyer, owned about 27 percent of the stock of these Michigan companies. Their management, however, continued to be ineffective and the results unprofitable. In the meantime Mr. Warren had acquired in his own right a very considerable interest in the stock in some of these Michigan corporations."

"All this resulted in a movement for the consolidation of six Michigan companies which culminated in 1906 in the organization of the Michigan Sugar company. Mr. Warren was not a member of this joint company. "When the valuation was completed all the properties of these companies were transferred to the Michigan Sugar company and it is not suggested that there was any unfairness in these valuations that any stockholders complained of the transaction."

"This stock, as I understand it, was issued in the name of Mr. Warren and immediately endorsed by him in blank and delivered to the proper office of the Michigan Sugar company for transfer and delivery to the American Sugar Refining company or the individuals who owned it. Then and there Mr. Warren's relation to the American Sugar Refining company or to the eastern stockholders of the Michigan Sugar company terminated and he was never employed by the American Sugar Refining company or by any one who was operating for it or in its interest, except for service rendered in the state of Michigan looking to the betterment of the sugar situation in Michigan."

With reorganization completed approval of the standing committee states, the senate had a clear road today for further consideration of the nomination of Warren.

Approval of the committee line-ups by which the La Follette insurgents are demoted from their previous committee ranking, was voted by the senate late yesterday 64 to 11 after five hour's debate.

A resident Coolidge fully supports the action of senate republicans in replacing insurgents in important committee places with regulars and considers that the question at issue is one of making it possible for his party to govern the country.

The whole question as the president sees it, was whether congress was to be organized in such a fashion that the republican party could carry out its campaign pledges.

The chairmanship of the important committees and a majority on each one he believes should not automatically go to members of the dominant party and there should be no objection to the exclusion of others from these responsibilities.

Authority and funds for the senate elections committee to begin investigations this summer of the contests involving the senate of Senators Brookhart, Iowa; Schall, Minnesota, and Bratton, New Mexico, were voted today by the senate.

Notice was given today in the senate by Senator Harris, democrat, Georgia, that he would move to discharge the foreign relations committee from further consideration of the world court.

To Resume War Tax Probe Resumption next Monday of its inquiry into tax settlements was determined upon today by the special senate investigation committee.

Chairman Couzens said the committee's decision was made yesterday in the senate that the treasury was seeking to "discredit" him by re-opening his 1919 return.

"That matter was not discussed," he said. "Our staff has been at work preparing cases and will be ready to present them beginning Monday. In April the staff will prepare further cases for presentation in May before the hearings finally are brought to an end on June 1 by senate order."

Since the senate will not be in session during the remainder of the hearings, the testimony given in secret will not become available to the public until the new congress assembles.

Teeth For Prohi Law Enactment of legislation by the next congress to provide heavier penalties for violators of the prohibition laws was recommended today by a sub-committee of the house alcoholic liquors committee.

President Coolidge, in filling vacant federal judgeships, will offer some appointments to democrats.

The president does not consider the selection of judges a partisan question, although as a rule he will continue to appoint republicans.

No judicial nominations will be sent to the senate, however, until the nomination of Charles B. Warren of Michigan as Attorney-General is confirmed and the president has an opportunity to consult with him.

Washington baseball officials today put in their bid to have President Coolidge to open the season here April 23, by throwing out the first ball in the game with the New York Yankees.

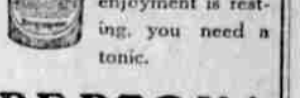
Today's Cross-Word Puzzle A MYSTIC MAZE—PUZZLE NO. 118. Edited by J. C. Boyd.
