POPE PIUS GREETS AMERICAN VISITORS

ROME, Mar. 11.—The members of the American Holy Year pilgrimage from Boston together with a considerable number of tourists and American residents of Rome, gathered in the vatican this morning to enjoy the honor of a special mass celebrated for them by Pope Pius.

Their number was so great that an altar was erected in the ducal hall especially for the event. Cardinal O'Connell, the head of the pilgrimage and the members of his staff occupied the chief places. When the Pope appeared the entire assembly knelt and all followed the papal mass with religious fervor.

LITHUANIA MAKES PROTEST TO POPE

RIGA, Latvia, Mar. 11.—Dispatches from Kovna say the Lithuanian government has instructed its representative at the vatican to protest against the conclusion of a Concordat with Poland and the broken negotiations between the Lithuanian and Papal representatives for a Concordat.

FRANCE IN NEED OF FOREIGN LOAN

PARIS, Mar. 11.—A foreign loan of four or five billions of francs to enable the treasury to pay its obligations promptly is France's fundamental need in the present and approaching financial crisis, says Louis Loucheur in an interview published by Le Journal. The paper had appealed to him as an outstanding expert in finance, to suggest a way out for the country, facing the maturity of twenty-three billion francs worth of securities this year.

ONE CENT POSTALS TO BE IN DEMAND

WASHINGTON, Mar. 11.—Anticipation much larger use of the one cent postal card by business firms for advertising purposes, instead of private mailing cards, the post office department has given the public printer orders for millions of these cards. The new postal law increases the rate on souvenir and all other private mailing cards from one cent to two cents, beginning April 15.
