## WARREN'S NAME RE-SUBMITTED TO THE SENATE

sult in lengthening the special session of the senate, which the leaders had hoped to end on Saturday.

Upon its re-submission the Warren nomination will have to travel the regular course through the Judiciary committee, which includes among its members some of the leading opponents of confirmation. There will be many opponents to interpose delays, should the opposition decide that sort of strategy is advisable. In their re-assessment of the situation, the republican leaders pointed out that when confirmation failed Tuesday on a forty to forty tie, not only Vice-President Dawes but several of the republican regulars among the senate membership were absent. They also declared that several of the democrats, who were out of the chamber when the vote was taken could be won over to support the nomination.

President Coolidge is understood to have left it to Mr. Warren to decide whether his name should again be submitted. The nominee withheld judgment until he had been given by Senator Butler a detailed report of senate sentiment. In several respects the picture of the situation painted by the Massachusetts senator differed from the pessimistic report taken to the White House yesterday by titular leader of the republican senate organization, including Chairman Cummings of the Judiciary committee. Senator Butler insisted, however, that these leaders had been alarmed unduly by their defeat of last Tuesday, and he presented evidence that appeared convincing to the president and Mr. Warren. Publicly Mr. Warren would make no comment.

Three hours after the nomination had gone to the senate, this brief announcement was made by Secretary Sanders at the White House:

"At the request of the president, Mr. Warren consented to allow his name to be presented again to the senate."

was the greatest detective in the world, that he had the Marshall Field murder solved or a lot of other things which may make you think he was a darned old fool, but are you going to send him to the penitentiary for it?"

Mr. Stokes was termed an old man who had been taken advantage of by "a lot of blood suckers seeking his money," while he put in years investigating his wife. "As foolish as he was I say to you gentlemen, he never did a criminal act," said Rathbun. "If he had been bent on defaming his wife, would he with all his money have put in the weeks and months investigating?"

"All he did was to get a lot of information, some of which makes a man think."

Rathbun assailed Mrs. Stokes for not being satisfied with the vindication given her through Stokes' two unsuccessful divorce suits in which he named other men, and in trying to have the father of her children declared a convict.

"There is something back of it," said Rathbun.

He referred to the \$800,000 Stokes settled upon his wife and children and read the agreement in which Stokes acknowledged paternity of the boy and girl born in 1914 and 1915.

## TEAPOT DOME CASE IS BEING PROBED

**CHEYENNE, Wyo., Mar. 12.**—Liberty bonds alleged to have passed between Harry P. Sinclair and Albert B. Fall, nominal lessee and lessee, respectively, of Teapot Dome naval oil reserve, were theorectically started on a backward journey by the government today in the trial of the lease annulment case here.

Calling witnesses from banks in El Paso, Texas, Carrizozo, N. M., and Pueblo, Colo., in addition to H. V. Spillman of Washington register of the treasury, government counsel offered skeletonized testimony on which Federal Judge T. Blake Kennedy reserved ruling as to its admissibility, involving \$90,000 in liberty bonds, after Owen J. Roberts of the attorneys for the plaintiff declared to the court that

he would prove later that there was a connection between Sinclair and Fall and the bonds and that Fall received the securities from an agent of Sinclair and that Fall used the coupons.

Beginning at El Paso where Fall had an account at the First National bank the government metaphorically whisked the securities to Carrizozo, Pueblo, Denver and Washington.

The question as to the admissibility of testimony regarding Fall's bank account was raised when J. W. Lacey of defense counsel, objected to the El Paso bank records on the grounds that they had no bearing on any one involved in the defense. He cited dozens of rollings where such records had been excluded from courts, however when Judge Kennedy announced he would reserve ruling on their admissibility, Mr. Roberts proceeded with identification of bank records and liberty bond coupons.

L. C. Dunbar, cashier of the El Paso bank was the first witness. He possessed records of Fall's account from December 22, 1919, to April 28, 1924. Here Mr. Lacey plunged into his long oration.

## PLAN AIR MAIL TO MANILA FROM S. F.

**MANILA, March 12.**—A Manila branch of the national aeronautic association of America was organized here today for the purpose of obtaining air mail service from San Francisco to Manila by way of Honolulu and Guam.

The association plans to bring to the attention of President Coolidge, Secretary Weeks, Wilbur and other government officials, the need for a trans-Pacific air mail service. An attempt will be made also to bring about a flight of the dirigible Los Angeles to Manila. The Manila organization plans close co-operation with the Honolulu unit in the promotion of the trans-Pacific mail service.

Stanley Williams, manager of the International Banking Corporation was elected president of the organization perfected today. Thirty three Americans became charter members.

## MARKETS

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

**PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 12.**—A stagnant condition of the eastern wool market has resulted in lower prices in the Pacific Northwest. Today local buyers are out with new buying price lists showing reductions from 3 to 5 cents a pound. Bids now range around a 25 cent top on valley fine and mid head with medium or 3-8's blood worth from 39 to 35 cents.

Bids for lower grade wools also show a liberal reduction with best offers now for coarse or quarter blood ranging from 28 to 22 cents. Cottswold and Braid are bringing bids around 25 cents.

Eastern Oregon, Washington and Idaho ranch clips are down around 39 cents a pound.

Some reports have been received here that Germany is buying freely of Merino and fine greasy cross-breeds.

Top grade eggs are again higher on the exchange with extra back to 33 cents and firsts at 32 cents. Other grades are steady and unchanged. Receipts are liberal but well taken. Storage activities here are on a big scale for so early in the season with more than four carloads put in cooler during the past ten days.

The butter market continues steady and unchanged. Supply is well balanced with requirements and trading shows a healthy tone.

The live poultry market is steady and unchanged with receipts moderate but sufficient for local demand.

Country dressed meats are easier today with few buyers willing to pay over 17 cents for top hogs. Choice live veal is steady at 16 to 16 1/2 cents.
