PASS PROTOCOL ON TO LEAGUE'S NEXT ASSEMBLY

Britain's Qualified Assent Leaves Point Open for Future Decision.

CANADA IS DISSENTER

Protests War Restriction Because United States, by Staying Out, Not Amenable Too.

GENEVA, Mar. 13.—The debate in the League of Nations council on the security protocol elaborated at the last assembly ended this morning with the adoption of a proposition by Dr. Benes, the Czechoslovakian foreign minister, to refer to the next assembly the protocol and recommendations made by British Foreign Secretary Chamberlain and other members, together with any further declarations received from governments members of the League.

Mr. Chamberlain declared he accepted the Benes resolution, and after it was adopted he reiterated that Great Britain remained firmly attached to the principle of arbitration and disarmament relating to the protocol only because the league protocol itself appeared to be qualified to defend the principles represented by every power present.

Canada has notified the League of Nations that she cannot adhere to the league's security protocol but is prepared to consider acceptance of jurisdiction by the world court of justice for reduction of armaments which does not involve prior acceptance of the protocol.

A communication developing this point received by cable from Premier Mackenzie King, declares that after careful examination of the protocol the instruction given has reported the following conclusions: "First, Canada should continue to give whole hearted support to the League of Nations particularly its work of conciliation, co-operation and publicity."

"Second, we do not consider it in the interest of Canada, the British Empire or the League itself to recommend parliamentary adherence to the protocol, particularly its rigid provisions for application of economic or military sanctions in practically every future war."

Among the grounds for this conclusion is consideration of the effect of the non-participation of the United States upon attempts to enforce sanctions (penalties), and particularly so in the case of a contiguous country like Canada.

France is Surprised
PARIS, Mar. 13.—"It was a first class funeral, which took us entirely by surprise," was the comment today by one of Premier Herriot's collaborators on British Foreign Secretary Chamberlain's assault upon the league security protocol before the league council in Geneva yesterday.

Mr. Chamberlain's action brought great surprise throughout French official circles where it was expected he would ask further postponement of action by the council on the universal pact without seeking to give it its death blow.

The view generally held here of yesterday's proceedings at Geneva is that, in killing the League of Nations security protocol, British Foreign Secretary Chamberlain, nearly killed the league. Those papers supporting the government, such as L'Oeuvre, admit that some of Mr. Chamberlain's criticisms are justified, but claim the protocol could have been perfected to meet them.

sixth assembly, opening in September, will institute an entirely new examination of the problem of international peace and reduction of armaments including the British suggestion for special defensive treaties operating under the guidance of the league.

In his address on the subject Foreign Minister Benes of Czechoslovakia frankly agreed with some of the criticisms of the protocol the British secretary for foreign affairs had voiced in his speech yesterday, but repudiated Mr. Chamberlain's contention that the protocol destroyed the balance and spirit of the covenant. He recalled that the great war had destroyed four great empires, upset dynasties, demolished ancient frontiers, given birth to new countries, dislodged governing classes between states and classes.

The war, Dr. Benes declared, had put states in opposition to one another and had created new problems of great complexity. From Finland to Constantinople straight down through Europe, he insisted there now exist causes of conflict and the murder of a frontier agent might conceivably start the terrible war over again. The world, he declared, desires to find other measures than force to settle disputes and this was true especially of the smaller nations, which desired to live in peace and security. That, he said, was why arbitration was put in the protocol.

He insisted that whatever might be the weaknesses of the instrument which was constructed in one short month at Geneva, the ideas behind it were essential to the league and to the world to prevent further destructive wars.

LOS ANGELES, Mar. 13.—Tom Kennedy, prize fight matchmaker, today telegraphed Jack Kearns, manager of Jack Dempsey, asking terms for a Dempsey-Jack Remaitt bout, ten rounds, for the heavyweight title, to be staged in Los Angeles during the spring convalescence here next June. Kearns is enroute east.

bins and the community houses, and about 6 feet in front of the cabins, will be concrete walks paralleling the cabins, and connecting with the community buildings. This will leave six foot gardens between the walks and the center line.

It is the purpose of the owners to fill these spaces with flowers and shrubs, which will make it very attractive. The tree planting and landscaping plans, will be spread over a period of three years.

A septic tank is being constructed to provide sanitation, the government plan of construction being followed. A crew of about twenty men has been employed, so that the work is being pushed as rapidly as possible. The cement work is being done by Contractor Stanley Taylor.
