NEW YORK, March 13.—A program of naval and military operations without parallel in the peace time history of the United States is revealed for the next two months in the presence of the United States fleet in San Diego harbor here.

April 3—Review of more than 120 sea fighters off San Pedro enroute to San Francisco where the fleet will arrive April 5.

April 15—Departure of the fleet on mission of invasion of the Hawaiian Islands, the first working out in actual practice of such a problem.

April 25—Beginning of the attack upon Hawaii with the full force of the United States fleet engaged in the attack and the army forces of Hawaii, together with naval forces stationed there, national guard and army reserves defending the island.

May 7 to 25—Fleet maneuvers off Hawaii, involving the largest torpedo attack problem staged by the navy.

DEER SAVES SELF FROM ONE PERIL BUT IS KILLED.

COLUMBIA FALLS, Montana, March 13.—How a deer ingeniously saved itself from peril only to be killed before it could escape from another, was told here by Mike Kelliber, section foreman on the Great Northern railroad.

Kelliber said he saw the deer floating down the Flathead river in Bad Rock canyon on a cake of ice. Apparently the animal had ventured out on an ice "bridge" and had been carried away when the flows parted.

The ice cake was rushing down the canyon toward a high water fall, which meant certain death. As if it realized this, the deer closely watched for a favorable opportunity and as it was carried close to shore in an eddy, sprang from the ice cake to the bank.

But just as it dove from the ice a train came at high speed around the rocky bend. The momentum of the deer's leap carried it onto the track into the path of the train, and the cowcatcher caught it and tossed the game little animal back into the river—dead.
