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CITY TREASURER MAKES REPORT FOR THE YEAR OF 1924

City Treasurer W. F. Thomas last night filed with the city council his financial report for the year of 1924, the report being complete up to December 31. The city started the year with a balance of \$13,235.53, and completed the twelve months with a balance of \$3,008.21. The city received in taxes \$39,259.82; from fines \$2,038.25, licenses \$551.50, dog licenses \$228, and sundries \$3.27. Making the total receipts \$58,581.17, while there was paid out \$50,572.99.

Sinking fund Number 1 increased from \$19,051.99 on January 1 to \$22,608.21, on December 31. During the year the city paid or redeemed 14 improvement bonds amounting to \$13,000 and has called \$7,800 worth of bonds which have not yet been presented.

On improvement bond interest, the city paid during the year \$7,639.89, and has a balance in this fund of \$1,474.94.

The library bonds brought \$12,401, and the disbursements from that fund have been \$11,326.23, leaving a balance of \$1,074.67.

The summary shows that the cash on hand January 1 in all funds was \$24,575.71, and that the cash received during the year was \$145,752.83. The amount paid out from the general fund and improvement fund combined, was \$149,395.53, leaving a balance in both accounts of \$27,152.53.

KIWANIANS HAVE A FINE PROGRAM

The educational committee of the Roseburg Kiwanis club had charge of the program today at the noon-hour luncheon and those who attended were greatly pleased. Walt Fisher had charge of the announcements and kept the ball rolling in a lively manner. Prof. Campbell and the president, Bill Hardin, gave two excellent addresses on Kiwanis ideals. The Kiwanis quartette sang beautifully and were called back for an encore. Tom Nees gave a short talk regarding the Chamber of Commerce drive for members. A spaghetti eating contest for the prize was one of the comic features of the program. Lyman Spencer won the race by a "nose." One interesting feature introduced at today's luncheon was the distribution of a Kiwanis newspaper, "The Builder." Senator Eddy and O. C. Brown acted as newboys and their wares met with a ready sale.

TAKING TROUT EGGS AT FISH HATCHERY

T. H. Hill, superintendent of the Rock Creek trout hatchery, was in Roseburg today. He brought in his son Harry, who is suffering from an infection in his face. Mr. Hill states that the hatchery will not operate at full capacity this year, owing to the fact that the greater part of the rainbow run got by. The high water washed out around one end of the dam, and the fish got upstream before the water became low enough to make repairs. Mr. Hill expects to get about a quarter of a million eggs, mostly cut throats, together with some steel heads and a few rainbows. During the summer he expects to raise both ends of the dam, so that in the future high water will not cut around the obstruction as was done this year.

CONFERENCE OF COUNTY W. C. T. U. HELD HERE TODAY

The county convention of the W. C. T. U. was held at the M. E. Church South today. The attendance was very good, the program following along the line as announced, except that Miss Jewell failed to arrive in time for the morning meeting. She came in on the noon train and spoke at the conference immediately following the basket lunch, which was served in the basement of the church between 12 and 1 o'clock. At 2 o'clock she spoke at an assembly of the high school student body, and at 3 o'clock before the Roseburg Woman's Club.

The conference sessions of the morning were given over largely to departmental topics, talks being made by county officers and heads of the local unions.

In the afternoon talks were made by Mrs. Edith Eckert, county school superintendent and Senator B. L. Eddy, the senator explaining the new prohibition fund law, as adopted by the recent legislature.
