SHIPPING BOARD

VESSELS ARE SOLD

WASHINGTON, Mar. 18.—Sales of shipping board vessels to private interests the past six months have been very gratifying, in the opinion of Chairman O'Conner of the board, who in a statement today, favored an extreme "liberal sales policy" in order to get the remainder of the government's fleet into private hands for operation under the American flag.

During the last six months the statement said, the shipping board has sold to American citizen more than 30 veel of 176,898 deadweight tons for approximately \$2,500,000.

"The board has under negotiations at the present time prospective sales of additional passenger and freight vessels, on lines now operated by the government," the chairman said.

KING GEORGE TO TAKE TRIP SOUTH

Will Leave Tomorrow on Trip Prescribed For Him by His Physicians During Recent Attack of Bronchitis

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
LONDON, Mar. 18.—King George leaves tomorrow on the southern trip prescribed by his physicians during his recent attack of bronchitis.

Accompanied by Queen Mary he will leave Dover, thence crossing to Calais where the party will board the British royal train which is usually kept at Dunkirk in readiness for such occasions.

Arriving at Genoa on Friday they will embark on the royal yacht Victoria and Albert which is also under escort of two British destroyers. The itinerary of the Mediterranean cruise has not been fully arranged but probably will include visits to the Islands of Malta and Majorca and it is stated that the King will witness the British naval maneuvers off the latter place.

Owing to King George's infrequent absences since his enthronement in 1910, the appointment of a special committee to care for the business of state while he is away has almost an air of novelty, and the newspapers print at length the quaint official announcement issued from the palace yesterday in saluted, medieval phraseology.

"For divers causes and considerations," it said, "the King instructed his right and trusty and well loved counselors, Prince Henry, the Archbishop of Canterbury, Viscount Cave and Premier Baldwin, to look after the safety and good government of the realm during his absence; empowering them to do anything that appears necessary and expedient to them except dissolve parliament or confer ranks and titles."

Such a commission has acted only once previously during the reign of the present sovereign—when he went to India, in 1911.

HIGH SCHOOL PLANS ADOPTED BY BOARD REGULAR MEETING

The school board met last night in its regular session and spent a great deal of time investigating the tentative plans for the new high school building as altered and modified.

The new plans call for a larger gymnasium than originally provided, also for some shifting in departmental rooms, and other minor changes. The plans have now been approved and the architects will proceed with the detailed plans and specifications. The board adopted a resolution authorizing the sale of the school bonds, which are to be issued in the sum of \$165,000, and also adopted a resolution confirming the purchase of the property.

Miss Emma Ueland, now in charge of the domestic arts department in the schools of Juneau, Alaska, was employed to take charge of this department in the Roseburg schools next year, taking the place of Miss Janet Ward who will not teach next term. Miss Ueland was a member of the faculty a few years ago and her work is exceptionally good and the board feels delighted that she is to return. Her parents reside here, and consequently she desires to teach in the Roseburg schools, although she has been offered positions at a much higher rate of pay than the Roseburg schools can afford.
