### TITLE SUIT HEARD IN CIRCUIT COURT

The suit of Ashley and Rumlun against the Fir Pine Lumber company, the Glendale State Bank and others, was heard before Judge F. W. Hamilton today. This is an action in which the plaintiffs are seeking to recover \$25,000 alleged to be due on a promissory note, together with interest, bringing the total to about \$35,000. The case is a very technical one, involving the intricacies of a tax sale, the entire issue being based upon whether or not the Glendale State Bank in buying in delinquent tax certificates and gaining title to the timber property given as security on the mortgage, acted alone or as an agent. The land which was allowed to become delinquent in taxes, and was bought at tax sale by the Glendale State Bank. The persons holding the mortgage are now endeavoring to set up their claim to title.

Attorneys Corliss and Howell of Portland, appear for the plaintiffs and Attorney Dexter Rice for the defense.

### RELIGIOUS RIOTS DISTURB MEXICO

MEXICO CITY, Mar. 18.—Disorders in Queretaro growing out of the schism among the Catholics and adherents of the so-called Mexican apostolic Catholic Church are reported in dispatches received here.

One person was killed and two were wounded in a clash Monday between a group of workers and a number of Catholics who mistook the workers for followers of a new sect and believed they were attempting to seize the Santa Cruz church.

Yesterday the Catholics organized a manifestation, marching through the streets and destroying the windows of the Methodist church because, the dispatches say, they believed the Methodist pastor to be connected with the separatists.

### DR. SCHURMAN TO TAKE BERLIN POST

WASHINGTON, Mar. 18.—The transfer of Dr. Jacob Gould Schurman from his post as minister at Peking to succeed Alanson B. Houghton as ambassador to Gorman for which assignment he was promptly confirmed by the senate yesterday, leaves the Peking post and that of Ambassador to Argentina as the two major diplomatic vacancies yet to be filled. An intimate knowledge of affairs there is understood to be sought in the appointment of Peter Augustus Jay, present minister to Rumania to that post.

### SPRING FOOTBALL RESUMED MARCH 20

EUGENE, Mar. 18.—Spring football practice at the University of Oregon will be resumed March 20 the date of the opening of the spring term after the vacation period. Oregon already has had six weeks of practice, and Coach Dick Smith thinks an additional amount of time will be required to drill the players in fundamentals in passing, tackling, blocking and punting.

Football candidates will be divided into four squads. Each squad will have about fifteen men. Twice a week on Wednesday and Saturday, the squads will be put through scrimmage practice. Players making the most showing will be placed on the varsity squad at the start of the fall practice September 15.

Coach Smith and Virgil Earl, athletic director, will coach the four squads.

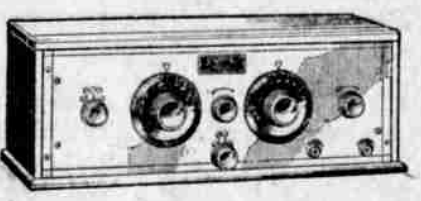
Base Williams, new line coach will not join the team until fall practice begins.
