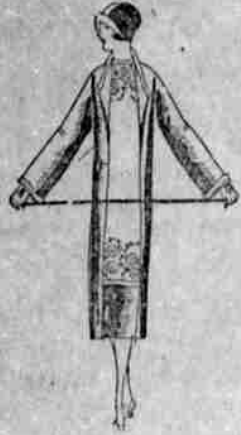

PORTLAND MARKETS

(Associated Press Local Wire)
PORTLAND, Mar. 19.—Reports of a two cent advance in print butter, current along the coast did not fully materialize. The actual advance amounted to one cent with prints being listed at 48c and cartons 49c today. Butter fat bids also advanced one cent with 48c being paid for cream, delivered Portland. Fat prices in the country range from 46c to 47c.
The butter market is very strong at the advance.
Live poultry receipts are scarce with demand keen. Light hens firm at 19 and 20 cents; heavy hens 22 to 23 cents. Springs are nominal at 23 cents.
There is no change in country dressed meats. Top calves are quoted at 16 1/2 and top hogs at 15c.
Oregon butter is extremely scarce for this time of year with both fancy and undergrade stock in demand. Unless there is a great improvement in production soon values are expected to continue on the upward trend.
Egg market easier with extras and current receipts a cent lower on the exchange at 31 and 27 cents respectively. Receipts continue liberal with demand less keen.
