WHEAT SLUMPS AS RUMORS RUN RIFE

CHICAGO, March 20.—With a sensational break in prices at Liverpool reported and with advices that a big grain firm in Antwerp was in financial difficulty, the wheat market here had a wild start today at an immediate setback of more than five cents a bushel.

May wheat opened at \$1.55 1/2 to \$1.60 as against \$1.09 1/2 to \$1.04, yesterday's closing figures. Fluctuations after the opening in the wheat market were rapid, but rallies soon became the rule and extreme downturns of 5 1/2 during the initial transactions proved to be the limit for at least the time being. So eager was the selling at the start that many brokers beat the opening bell by half a minute.

Severe upsets in the price of other grain were also wild. Rye values were smashed down seven cents a bushel and corn nearly 50 in some cases.

WINNIPEG, March 20.—The wheat market today was again thrown into disorganization. May wheat hit the toboggan at the opening for a recession of 1-1/2 to \$1.57 1/2.
