FRENCH DEPUTIES FIGHT

(Associated Press Lead Wire.) PARIS, Mar. 20.—Free for all fights, such as probably had never before been seen in the Chamber of Deputies broke up this afternoon's session. The disturbance arose after Premier Herriot, in defending the government's policy in religious matters, had said: "We accept and welcome Christianity in its pure forms, but not the Christianity of bankers." Premier Herriot's supporters rose and cheered. The opposition rose and howled at the speaker. There was a great slamming of desks and shouting of imprecations and the most belligerent members of both sides, sped for the open space below the rostrum which became like a cockpit with a dozen pairs of deputies milling around and slugging wildly, but seldom landing squarely. The sergeants-at-arms in a body tried to form a wedge between the majority and opposition members but they were brushed aside. Then the chairman put on his hat and left the chamber as a signal that the session was suspended. Help came from the corridors and slowly the sergeants-at-arms began clearing the hall, drawing apart the units of the opposing forces.

Rear Admiral William A. Moffatt has been nominated by President Coolidge to continue as chief of the Navy's Bureau of Aeronautics. Ex-Governor James E. Ferguson, of Texas, whose wife is now Governor, and who was impeached several years ago on a charge of malfeasance in office, has virtually won his long fight for vindication, the Texas House of Representatives having voted to grant him amnesty and restore his citizenship. Princess Helmine, wife of the former Kaiser, has gone to Berlin to submit to an operation, according to London cables. Fascist Premier Benito Mussolini, of Italy, seriously ill in Rome, is said to be facing a grave intestinal operation.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 20.—A new naval giant will take her first dip at Camden, N. J., April 7 when the first line steapane carrier Saratoga slides off the ways of the New York Shipbuilding Corporation. When completed and commissioned with the fleet, some time late in 1925, she will be the biggest and fastest craft of the kind in the world, and will carry a fleet of 72 combat, observation and bombing planes. Launching of the Saratoga will mark an epoch in American naval construction, significant of the changes man's conquest of the air already has made in preparation for sea battles of the future. Mrs. Curtis D. Wilbur, wife of the naval secretary will act as sponsor for the big ship at the christening ceremonies, with high officials of the navy and other government departments witnessing the event.
