ROSE PAGEANT TO BE FESTIVAL FEATURE

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 20.—Montgomery Lynch of Seattle, who has been retained by the directors of the Portland Rose Festival, Inc., to direct the great Rose Pageant from the pen of Doris Smith of this city, reached Portland this week to take up his duties in connection with the assembling of the great cast. Mr. Lynch intends to get in touch with all the musical organizations in the city immediately to attend to the enrollment of the necessary 2000 vocalists. Offices have been opened at 605 Oregon Building.

Mrs. Smith's pageant which has received the highest commendation from such experts in pageantry as Percy J. Burrell and Montgomery Lynch, depicts the influence of the rose, symbol of love, upon mankind from the days of savagery to the present time and is arranged in ten episodes, all of which are accompanied with Chas. Wakefield Cadman's compositions. The first episode entitled "The Rose of Love" portrays the dawning of civilization. "Attar of Roses" is the title of the second number, calling for a setting in a Persian garden where beautiful maidens distill the perfume of the rose. The next episode has to do with the first attempt to cultivate the wild rose, when the hundred leafed Rose of Greece was developed. A lovely Grecian setting called for with marvelous color and light effects. In another scene King Solomon ascends his throne amid pomp and ceremony, his thousand wives appear with dancing girls and attendants. The second half of the pageant deals with episodes wherein the rose has been instrumental in affecting the history of the world. "The War of the Roses," "The Oregon Mission Rose" and "The Mary Washington Rose" and finally the Court of the Queen of Her Majesty the Queen of Rosharia are numbered among the lovely scenes of this part.

FRUIT INDUSTRY SHOWS RAPID DEVELOPMENT

The rapid development of the fruit industry in the United States during recent years is brought out in figures on carlot shipments compiled by the United States Department of Agriculture. More than 450,000 carloads of 17 leading fruits were shipped in 1923 as compared with 348,000 in 1920. Expansion has been most marked in the shipments of apples, oranges and grapes. Shipments of apples increased from 109,000 carloads in 1920 to 134,000 in 1923. Oranges jumped from 50,000 carloads in 1920 to 76,000 carloads in 1923. Shipments of grapes were 41,000 cars in 1920 and 65,000 cars in 1923.

The information has been compiled from monthly reports furnished to the department by about 15,000 station agencies of railroad, express, and boat lines, and has been made into a printed statistical bulletin for the convenience of members of the industry in facilitating the successful marketing of the crop.

NEBRASKA THROATS WILL BE PARCHED

OMAHA, Neb., Mar. 20.—In ten days Nebraska will be drier than the driest bone-dry state in the union, state officials predicted today. The prediction was based on the effect of the celebrated "pint of liquor bill" which became a Nebraska law this morning when Governor McMullen signed the measure. The bill had passed both branches of the state legislature with large majorities.

FRONTIER DISPUTE HAS BEEN SETTLED

GENEVA, Mar. 20.—The frontier dispute between Poland and Lithuania has been settled.

Lithuania protested to the League of Nations early this week after an alleged attack on Lithuanian frontier guards by Polish patrols.

A communique given out by the Lithuanian legation in Paris said the Poles attacked without provocation last Monday night and had threatened to occupy the district of Sirvintal by force of arms unless the Lithuanians evacuated it.

TEX RICKARD IN TOILS OF THE LAW

TRENTON, N. J., Mar. 20.—Sentence will be passed Tuesday on Tex Rickard, promoter of sporting events, convicted with four others last night of conspiracy and interstate transportation of films of the Dempsey-Carpenter prize fight. Rickard was found guilty on one count of conspiracy and on two of transportation of the films. For the conspiracy charge the law provides a maximum penalty of two years imprisonment in a federal penitentiary, or a fine of \$10,000 or both. For transportation the defendant may be fined \$1,000 on each count.

COMMERCIAL AIR LINE ESTABLISHED

NEW YORK, Mar. 20.—The New York World says today that a commercial air line is to be established between Boston and St. Paul to carry passengers for 15 cents a mile, making the 1400 mile journey in 14 hours.
