CAMBRIDGE, Mass., March 20.—Dr. Charles W. Eliot, president emeritus of Harvard University observed his 91st birthday quietly today at his home here. Hundreds of telegrams were received from all parts of the country and the world conveying greetings.

VANCOUVER, Wash., March 20.—Plans for a centennial exposition here July 4 to August 4, to commemorate the founding of Fort Vancouver in 1825, were formally launched here yesterday

in a celebration which included breaking ground for a reproduction of the old fort, a parade and a banquet last night attended by more than 400 men from all parts of the Pacific Northwest.

### FORD WILL BUILD AIRPLANE MOTORS

DETROIT, Mich., Mar. 20.—The Detroit-Free-Press today quotes Edsel Ford, president of the Ford Motor company as saying that his company will go into the production of airplane motors as soon as experiments in progress at its laboratories are completed.  
Mr. Ford also is quoted as saying that construction will be started at once in the Ford Airport of the largest dirigible mooring mast in the world, to be constructed at a cost of \$75,000 for the mooring of the Shenandoah and Los Angeles or any other craft of similar or greater size.

### AL. G. BARNES INDICTED.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., March 19.—Al G. Barnes, circus magnate, was indicted by the federal grand jury here today on counts of perjury and falsification of income tax returns. Judge William James, before whom the indictment was returned, issued a bench warrant for Barnes' arrest and set his bail at \$50,000.

The indictment alleges the circus man, whose full name is Alpheus G. Barnes Stonehouse, under-declared his personal net income for 1921 by about \$40,000, and that of the Al G. Barnes Amusement company by more than \$80,000.
