KITCHEN CUPBOARD By NELLIE MAXWELL Food for Winter THE winter season is not a handicap to a variety of salads, though they will of necessity be limited to green fresh vegetables. Canned vegetables will make a fair substitute in many cases. Spanish Onion and Apple.—Take two cupsful of finely diced, good-flavored apple and one cupful of minced onion. Mix well with a good boiled dressing or a mayonnaise, using a bit of green pepper or parsley for a garnish. Chestnut Salad.—Cook the large chestnuts, after blanching them, in chicken broth, until they are soft. Season with salt and cut into small pieces, mix with an equal quantity of more of diced celery. Serve with a rich mayonnaise dressing. Cabbage with pineapple is a good combination, using a slice or two of pineapple to a pint of chopped cabbage and a boiled dressing. Pea and Walnut Salad.—Take canned peas and an equal quantity of walnut meats broken into bits. Mix with a French dressing. Let stand an hour to marinate and serve in lemon cups with mayonnaise. Vienna Salad.—Take equal parts of finely cut celery and diced apple with a little green pepper. Mix well with a good salad dressing and add a little chopped red pepper as a garnish. Potato and Nut Salad.—Cut three boiled potatoes into dice, add three hard cooked eggs, also diced; one-half cupful of broken walnut meats; a dozen slices minced. Mix well with a lightly seasoned French dressing and let stand an hour or more. Serve with roses of mayonnaise. Supper Dish.—Spread stale slices of bread with butter. Lay in a deep baking dish and sprinkle well with grated or finely divided cheese. Cover with a custard, using one pint of milk, two eggs, a little salt and a sprinkling of cayenne. Accused by Husband in Scandal Mrs. Dorothy Muriel Dennistoun Lieutenant-Colonel Ian O. Dennistoun, testifying in the suit of Mrs. Dorothy Muriel Dennistoun, his former wife, in the London Courts, charged that on coming home one night he found his bed had been occupied. He said his wife told him the tenant had been Oscar S. Benson, an American, whom she first said she befriended when he lost the key to his apartment, but later, according to Dennistoun, admitted misconduct with him. Mrs. Dennistoun, who is seeking to regain funds amounting to \$5,000 she alleges she advanced to Dennistoun, now the husband of Douglas Lady Carnarvon, charged he had "sold" her to General Sir John Gowat, British Quartermaster General during the war, in order that he might personally benefit by promotion in military and diplomatic circles.
