STREET PAVING PETITIONS OUT

Petitions were put in circulation today asking for the paving of a street between East 4th street and East 6th street in North Roseburg. The paving is desired to afford better fire protection, for at present if the truck makes a run out East 6th street it must come back almost a mile to reach E. 4th street. The pavement would connect up over the hill, following A avenue which was originally laid out as an alley, but which is being made into a street for this purpose.

It is proposed to extend the pavement of East 4th street and East 5th street for one block on each street, and then pave the avenue across, a distance of two blocks.

Several other paving petitions are now being circulated, and it is the hope of the council that all paving projects for the year may be grouped, so that the entire lot can be put up for bid at one time. This it is thought will invite outside bidders and will result in lower paving costs through competition.

LONDON, Mar. 23.—If dresses designed for the next courts at Buckingham palace now on view at the shops of various modistes, are followed, there will be less material seen than usual and more of the wearer's ankle.

Most of the models on view have the extremely short skirts which have come into vogue since the last court was held and against which there is no official regulation. The cut of the neck is very discreet, while the length of train and the veil is also restricted as at previous courts.

ROTARIANS OPEN ANNUAL MEETING

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

PORTLAND, Ore., March 23.—With approximately 1,000 delegates and visitors already on hand and more coming, the 12th annual convention of District Number 1, International Rotary, opened here today following a Sunday spent in entertainment.

John R. Bentley, director of the International was the principal speaker on the morning program, extending to delegates an invitation to the international convention of Rotary in Cleveland, Ohio, and giving an outline of the history of the organization.

Founded 20 years ago by a group of four men in Chicago with the motto "Service Before Self," Rotary has, Bentley said, grown through the world until it included 105,000 in 12 nations and with 188 clubs federated in the international body. District Governor Frank C. Riggs of Portland made his report this morning, and organization business was transacted. E. F. Flynn, district governor from St. Paul, Minn., and H. P. Irvine, of Portland, are to speak this afternoon. Tonight there will be a reception and a program of entertainment at the municipal auditorium.

OREGON SENATORS PROPOSED HEARINGS

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

WASHINGTON, Mar. 23.—Plans for two senate committees to conduct hearings in the west during congressional recess was outlined today by President Coolidge by Senators McNary and Stanfield, republicans, Oregon.

Beginning early in September the House Lands Committee intends to study public land problems in Montana, Idaho, Washington, Oregon, Nevada, New Mexico and Arizona.

During October the Irrigation and Reclamation Committee will hold hearings at several points along the Colorado River to determine what should be done by the government towards development of the power and for flood protection and irrigation on that waterway. Special attention will be paid to the proposed Boulder dam project.

QUARREL ENDS IN KILLING OF TWO

MILER CITY, Ind., Mar. 23.—John W. Kemp, 65, and his son, James Kemp, are dead as the result of a shooting affair that took place about 12 miles south of Micanok in the Powder River near here, and J. W. Stacey, 45, a unmarried man, is a suicide, having shot himself after killing the two Kemps, the belief of Sheriff Farnum and Coroner J. A. Graves, investigating the affair.

The tragedy took place during Saturday forenoon so far as could be learned, the bodies being found on the Stacey place Sunday noon. Stacey is a bachelor and is believed to have gotten into an argument with the Kemps who apparently had gone to his place to get a load of hay.

FIVE HUNDRED ON JURY PANEL FOR TENNESSEE TRIAL

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., March 23.—Five hundred gentlemen, three hundred more than the usual number summoned, were called to the court today for the trial of W. H. Bennett and Mrs. Mae Bennett, indicted on a charge of murdering Mrs. Augusta Hoffmann, aunt of Bennett. Bennett is a railroad official of Rome, Georgia.

Elements of mystery as to the alleged crime were to be explained at the trial. Mr. and Mrs. Bennett were indicted on a charge of murder in September, 1924, following the discovery of bones, said to have been those of a woman, under the house they occupied during their residence of more than four years in Chattanooga.

W. H. Bennett moved with his family to Chattanooga from Knoxville in 1912, was transferred to Rome, Georgia, in 1917 and has lived there since.

Miss Hoffmann made her home with the Bennetts in Chattanooga. At the preliminary hearing it was not brought out just when Miss Hoffmann was last seen here. Witnesses testified, however, that inquiries at the Bennett home as to the whereabouts of Hoffmann brought the conflicting information that she had returned to Knoxville and had married a "man named Brown," and removed to California.

FORMER EMPRESS OF MEXICO IS ILL

BRUSSELS, Mar. 23.—The aged former Empress Charlotte of Mexico, ill with the grippe, was declared today to have passed a satisfactory night. King Albert and the Princess Victor Napoleon Bonaparte, niece of Charlotte, visited her Saturday and Queen Elisabeth passed Sunday afternoon with her.

Charlotte's fortune is conservatively estimated at one hundred million francs. Baron Goffinet, who was private secretary to the late King Leopold, is the Belgian trustee. It is thought certain that when Charlotte dies the house of Hapsburg will bring forward certain claims, as it considers her an Austrian Arch-Duchess.

Charlotte, the daughter of Leopold I of Belgium, married the Austrian Arch-Duke Maximilian, who was shot in 1867 at the end of his ill-starred venture as Emperor of Mexico. The Viennese court always held that it retained the right of supervision over her fortune.

During the war a representative of the Hapsburg family had to be admitted to the control of her financial property and it is said that more direct interference was only avoided with difficulty.
