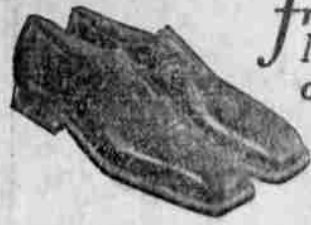

CONGRESS' MEDDLING DECLARED HARMFUL

(Associated Press Local Wire.) NEW ORLEANS, Mar. 24.—C. H. Markham, president of the Illinois Central railroad in an address made public in connection with the opening session of the tenth annual meeting of the Southern Pine Association here today said the transportation problem of the nation should be left to the interstate commerce commission without legislative interference.

"The threat of legislative tinkering with rates unifies business and does a great deal of harm," he asserted.

Turning to the subject of lumber Mr. Markham said the need for reforestation was acute, pointing out that the United States consumes nearly half of the world's cut of timber and two-fifths of all the forest products it produces.

VOLT FEATURES BOYS' AND GIRLS' CLUBS

This month's Volt published by The California Oregon Power company contains a very interesting study about boys and girls in northern California and southern Oregon, and their activities. The article contains the following introductory statement:

"The census of 1920 informs us that there were some four and a quarter million people in Oregon and California, the last time the census counted noses—a statistical statement—and not particularly interesting.

"But it becomes humanly interesting when we stop to realize that more than a million of these noses—almost a fourth of them—were, or quite recently had been, of that age when they were snubbed, ill-treated or neglected, and the source of much secret concern to their juvenile wearers.

"Twenty-five per cent of our entire population is of school age, each year thousands of these girls and boys stand forth, grow up, to lift their younger shoulders the responsibilities of business, property, of opportunity, ethics and government. That the universities, schools, county authorities, chambers of commerce, business clubs and representative citizens of both states are fully awake to the need of collective and constructive effort in creating opportunities by which these young citizens of tomorrow may learn the rules of wholesome competition in work and in play is shown by what Oregon and California are doing to support such organizations as the Boys' and Girls' Club and the Boy Scouts."

The progress of the Boy Scouts movement in this section of the country is interestingly told and the Volt has the following to say with particular reference to this county:

"Douglas county, with the support and generous financial assistance of the business community, has also expanded its Scout organizations. There are now three full troops in Roseburg, backed by \$100 contributed by the foresighted people of the community, and one excellent troop at Healdport."

outgrowth of a congressional measure known as the Smith-Lever Act. Under its provisions the U. S. Department of Agriculture, the State Agricultural College and the state departments of education cooperate in financing and directing this important work, which is immediately in charge of the county club agents, county school superintendents, agricultural agents, home demonstration agents and school supervisors. County funds and private contributions are largely depended upon for maintenance of the clubs and for their instruction.

Of particular interest to this county is the following:

"Douglas county now boasts 300 members of its Boys' and Girls' Clubs, and sent livestock judging teams and pruned-bread baking teams to win prizes at the state fair."

B. R. RICHTER DIES OF HEART TROUBLE

Bernard R. Richter, who for the past four years has conducted a grocery and general merchandise store at Camas Valley, died last night at his room at the Grand hotel, death coming from heart failure. Mr. Richter came to the city yesterday afternoon to attend a show, and after partaking of dinner went to the theatre where he apparently enjoyed the show. He and his wife returned to their room, and were talking of the show while preparing for bed, when he was suddenly stricken with a heart attack, and died before a physician could reach him.

Although he had sustained light attacks of heart trouble in the past, he had never been seriously ill from that complaint before, and was apparently in normal health up until the time he was so suddenly stricken.

He was a native of Germany having been born in that country 45 years ago. He came to the United States with his parents when but a year of age, and the family settled in Milwaukee. He later went to St. Paul, where he was engaged in the wholesale grocery business and also in oil until he moved to Roseburg in 1910. For the past four years he has been at Camas Valley operating the store there.

He leaves a wife and four sons, Bernard of Los Angeles, Albert of Petaluma, and Fred and Ralph of Roseburg.

He also leaves a brother, G. A. Richter, who resides in Roseburg, and a sister-in-law, Mrs. Annie Wood, at Camas Valley.

The funeral arrangements will not be made until word is received from the two sons in California.

TREASURY OFFICER IS TO RETIRE SOON

(Associated Press Local Wire.) WASHINGTON, March 24.—Another change in an important official position in the war department is being made under way, in prospect today as a result of the decision of Eliot Washburn, assistant secretary of the treasury in charge of foreign loans and railroad advances, to return to private life.

Mr. Washburn's resignation, it was made known, was handed to Secretary Mellon shortly before he left Washington at the end of a trip south, but has not yet been acted upon by the treasury department.

Administration leaders are understood to have not yet approached the matter of selecting a successor.

MAKES EFFORT TO REUNITE FAMILY

Only one child remains to be found and then Mr. and Mrs. Lester Crowe, of 508 Myers street, Portland, will have accounted for all 12 of the children of Mr. and Mrs. M. S. Crowe, who were residents of Roseburg about seven years ago, according to word from Portland.

About seven years ago the family was broken up when the father was sent to the penitentiary. At that time the family of thirteen, was living in a one-room house in North Roseburg and in deplorable conditions. The mother was arrested at Eugene where he took his 16-year-old daughter for a criminal operation, and was tried at Eugene for his relations with his daughter, and was sent to the penitentiary. He was later released under the state sterilization act.

The children were placed with the Boys and Girls Aid Society and Mrs. Crowe later divorced her husband and was remarried.

Lester Crowe, the oldest boy, is now married and residing in Portland and has been seeking for some time to locate the other 11 children. All were placed in charitable organizations later to be adopted out or cared for in private homes. He has succeeded in locating all members of the family except one child, Margaret, who is now between ten and eleven years of age.

She was adopted out by the Boys and Girls Aid Society and according to Miss Piteford, the county juvenile officer, who was in charge of the case here, was given an excellent home where she was happy and contented and well cared for. Miss Piteford states that the family into which the girl was adopted has moved away and she does not know the present location of the girl.

SOVIET PUTS FOOT ON SINCLAIR LEASE

(Associated Press Local Wire.) MOSCOW, March 24.—The concession of the island of Sakhalin granted the Sinclair oil interests by the Soviet authorities was annulled today by the Soviet court, which has been hearing the government's annulment plea. The court directed the government to return to the American company the 200,000 rubles guaranty it had deposited.

Suit for the annulment of the Sinclair Oil concession in Sakhalin was started by the Soviet government last month. It claimed the Sinclair company had failed to carry out the terms of its agreement with the government within the specified time and that the move for annulment was not prompted by the conclusion of the Russo-Japanese treaty which promised adjustment of the dispute between the two governments over their respective rights on the island, their southern half of which belongs to Japan and the northern to Russia.

(Associated Press Local Wire.) WASHINGTON, March 23.—President Coolidge today ordered an investigation to determine whether it is necessary to spend the \$1,500,000 appropriated in the deficiency bill for pay of National Guard members for drill work, directing that payments be withheld meanwhile.

The amount was appropriated to meet payments between now and June 30, but because it is over the budget bureau estimate the president ordered the investigation.
