7 COMPLETING SECOND TERM AT STATE COLLEGE

Douglas county has seven agricultural students who are completing their second term at the school year at Corvallis. They are, Emery Dalloy, sophomores, Roseburg; Maurice Black, freshman, Roseburg; George Bradburn, freshman, Roseburg; Robert Irving Wilbur, junior in animal husbandry; Mary Belt, sophomore in landscape architecture. She is the president of the Women's Agricultural Club. Her home is in Roseburg.

Nearly 400 students are enrolled in the school of agriculture. The regular work includes a study of the established principles of scientific agriculture, and the latest approved methods in farm practice. The first year in agricultural work, the students take up general courses in which deal with chemistry, botany, farm crops, animal and dairy husbandry, horticulture, soils, livestock management, farm mechanics, bacteriology, entomology, and poultry production.

Graduates from the school of agriculture find various fields of farming. Other occupations include many positions with the United States department of agriculture. They become cereal investigators, scientists in survey and research, officials of agricultural economics, marketing specialists, plant pathologists, bacteriologists, boys' and girls' club workers, county agents, seed inspectors, car loaders and checkers, grain exchange inspectors, landscape architects, and farmers of various kinds.

APPOINTMENTS TO STATE POSTS FILED

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 24.—A list of appointments developing upon President Moser of the state senate and Speaker Burdick of the lower house has been filed with the secretary of state. A committee provided by senate joint resolution No. 17 to investigate methods of assessment and taxation President Moser has appointed Senator Henry L. Corbett and A. A. Smith of Baker, and Speaker Burdick has appointed Representative John Carkin of Medford and Carl D. Shoemaker of Portland.

A special committee to study reforestation, authorized under house resolution 29, Senator Moser has appointed Senator Dennis of LaGrande and Russell Hawkins of Garibaldi, and Speaker Burdick has appointed Ray H. SENATOR BROOKHART DENIES DESERTION

DES MOINES, Ia., Mar. 24.—Denying allegations that he deserted the republican party in last year's campaign and obtained election to the United States senate "by fraud and deceit" Senator Smith W. Brookhart today criticized the content of his election brought by the republican state central committee as a "dishonest and fraudulent conspiracy."

The denial of the committee's charge was made in the senator's reply to the committee's protest recently filed with the senate. His answer was to be filed with the secretary of the senate simultaneously with its publication here.

Senator Brookhart declares he "became a candidate for the senate as a republican and upon historic principles of Abraham Lincoln and Theodore Roosevelt," that he announced his platform and that the voters of Iowa nominated and elected him on a definite stand for these principles.

In his campaign, the senator declared he "urged the voters to identify themselves with the republican party and continue to do so."

"The state central committee," Senator Brookhart continues, "has no power to remove a candidate's name from the ballot where the sovereign voters place it and all suggestion of this right is dishonest and fraudulent. It is an insinuation that the senate will consider fictitious and crooked."

The committee's resolution of protest against the seating of Senator Brookhart says the reply was without warrant of law and was prepared by R. B. Burnquist, chairman of the state central committee and H. E. Spangler, a member of the committee, "as a result of a conspiracy between them for the purpose of private gain and profit."

The committee, the senator declared, authorized the employment of counsel in fighting the protest and thereupon Burnquist proceeded to employ himself and Spangler for the purpose of collecting graft under the guise of attorney fees.

HISTORIAN FINDS ANCIENT RECORDS

NEW YORK, Mar. 24.—A chapter on "how to change an old man into a young man of twenty," has been found in the oldest treatise on medical science and surgery in the world, the Edwin Smith Papyrus of 166 B. C.

The discovery, made by Professor James H. Breasted, was announced today by Alexander J. Will, librarian of the New York historical society.

The passage on rejuvenation was written on the basis of the Papyrus, evidently by one of the quacks who infested even the ancient medical profession.

Dr. Breasted has not yet deciphered its details because he has devoted most of his work to the main text, which he considers a work of a "truly scientific man with an amazing knowledge of real medicine."

The passage reveals that the author knew that paralysis of one side of the body was caused by a brain affection of the other side, a fact lost for more than 2,000 years.

DECISION IS MADE ELIMINATE TOLLS

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Mar. 24.—Definite decision to eliminate toll roads on the Klamath-Rend highway was taken yesterday by the county court when they voted to pay the Bank, Threshers, owners of the Central Oregon stage company, \$500 for keeping the highway from Crescent to a point more than 40 miles south open for the next two months.

Whether or not this concern will be permitted to charge tolls for keeping the road open during the winter months will be delayed until later in the fall, it was said. Klamath officials expressed the hope that state and federal road agencies would aid in keeping the highway open during the winter, and thus eliminate the necessity of tolls.

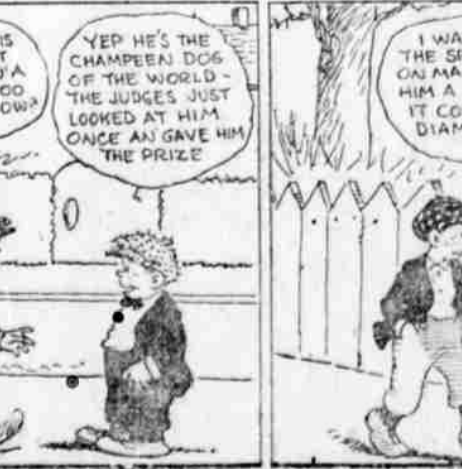

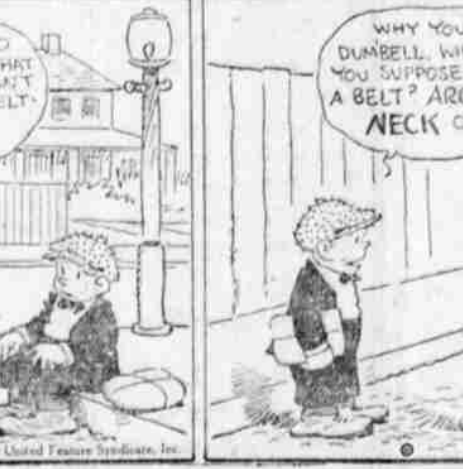
