JERUSALEM, Mar. 25.—The Mohammedan and Christian Arabs closed their shops today and ceased work on the occasion of the arrival of the Earl of Balfour as a protest against the famous declaration which he issued as foreign secretary committing Great Britain to the support of establishment of a Jewish homeland in Palestine.

The Arabs also withdrew all vehicles from the streets. No disorders have been reported. Lord Balfour on his arrival proceeded to the government house as the guest of Sir Herbert Samuel, the high commissioner.

STATE CHANGES BANKS. SALEM, Ore., Mar. 25.—State Treasurer Kay said today that since the state has transferred its New York fiscal agency from the National Park Bank to the National City Bank because the latter agreed to pay the state 2 per cent interest on its deposits, the National Park Bank has now made an offer of 2 1/2 percent. He said, however, that since all interested officials in Oregon have been notified of the change that the agency will not be transferred back to the National Park Bank. "I am very friendly to the National City Bank," said Kay, "but since it was the state's fiscal agent for 14 years and never paid us any interest I do not now feel that we should change back, for we have received extremely fair treatment from the National City Bank."
