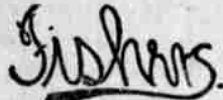

WOMAN WILL SEEK NO RECONCILIATION

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Mar. 25.—Mrs. Edith Potter Stillman, wife of James A. Stillman who is stopping here on her way to the Grand Canyon in Arizona denied today that she is here seeking a divorce from her husband and added that she would never seek a reconciliation. She is registered at a hotel here as Mrs. James A. Stillman and said she came here because friends advised her to visit the mud baths near here. Mrs. Stillman indicated that new litigation is expected. This, she said, might be an appeal to the supreme court of New York by her husband to have the verdict of the proceedings in 1921 set aside, in which it was decreed that Guy Stillman is his legitimate son and not the son of Fred Beauvais, an Indiana judge. "It's just one lawsuit after another," she said. "The difficulty is that I have never been able to understand Mr. Stillman's actions. This new suit is just something else."

MOVING MOUNTAIN HAS FAST RIVAL

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
DENVER, Colo., March 25.—The antics of Meeker's moving mountain in Rio Blanco county in western Colorado, has led to the revelation that the state has a rival "runaway peak" in the foothills near Golden, according to Charles W. Henderson, mineral geographer of the United States geological survey. Golden is 15 miles west of Denver. The condition is a common one, Henderson said. He reported that the Golden foothill has been marching steadily eastward for several years, interfering both with a highway and branch line of the Denver Tramway company. Every few weeks, according to Henderson, crews of workmen are required to shovel off tons of dirt. The Golden disturbance apparently is caused by the same thing as Meeker's phenomenon, mainly that a soft clay base for a heavy sandstone has become water soaked, longer hold the mountain up. Meantime the progress of Meeker's "moving mountain" continued uninterrupted. It slipped steadily along almost perceptibly yesterday and in two days has moved 100 yards.

room of their home when the mother forbade another excursion into the night life of San Francisco. When court was about to be convened, the girl, in an anteroom was photographed in various poses. She broke under the process and began screaming hysterically. Judge Harold Louderbacker ordered a recess of ten minutes so that she could be calmed.

Defense counsel announced they would object to further newspaper photographs of the defendant.

She has been subjected to this every day since the trial. J. McAtee, chief defense attorney, "and she's got too much of it."

Miss Ellington was fairly composed when she was brought in and court convened, examination of talesmen proceeded.

The girl still wore her fur trimmed coat buttoned closely around her. She was nervous.

Mrs. Doris R. Roche, mother of two girls and a boy was the first juror questioned. She was accepted temporarily.

Another mother, more elderly, next was asked her attitude toward the case of the girl slayer. This juror was Mrs. Alice L. Gordon. She has a married daughter.

She too satisfied the attorneys that she had no bias subject to challenge for cause.

The girl who pursued pleasure so relentlessly, now quiet and subdued, paid little apparent heed to these women who may be charged with her fate.

The defense cut the number of women in the jury box from four to three when it exercised its fifth peremptory challenge to excuse Mrs. Margaret Castro, seated yesterday.

Another talesman, John Miron, a contractor, said he once worked in an insane asylum. Asked whether this would affect his judgment of the potential issue of sanity in this case he was not certain.

"I know how crazy people act," he added. "Sometimes they're all up in the air for an hour and then for quite a while they have as much sense as anyone here."

He was excused on the ground of prejudice.

HIGHWAY FUND FOR OREGON ALLOWED

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 25.—Oregon's share of the \$7,500,000 appropriated by congress covering a two year period for forest highway construction amounts to \$445,399 for the fiscal year of 1925-26, according to computations made by the local office, United States Bureau of Highways.

For the most part these funds will be matched 50-50 by the state highway commission or the counties in which the federal money is to be expended.

The program for highway construction as outlined at the conference held in February between the state highway commission and representatives of the United States Forest Service and the bureau of Highways has been approved by Washington authorities, and work will now proceed on the various projects included in the program.

All of the federal aid money for the 1925-26 fiscal year has been allotted, but for the 1926-27 fiscal year \$50,000 was unallotted and will be held to meet any emergency which may arise.

The funds have been well distributed and provide for several new road projects and the completion of a number which already are under construction through the forest reserves.
