SECOND DERAILING TROUBLES RAILWAY OFFICIALS OF PARIS

PARIS, Mar. 26.—The Paris Vienna express, eastbound, jumped the track today near Provins, department of Seine-et-Marne, fifty miles from Paris, where two rails had been removed from the road-bed.

The wreck, following the wreckling of the Paris-Bordeaux express yesterday from causes as yet unexplained with the loss of five lives and the injury to fifty persons, has derailed railroad and official circles.

THREE NAMED IN DIVORCE PAPERS

NEW YORK, March 26.—Three men, all prominent socially were named as co-defendants today by Thomas H. Symington, wealthy Manhattan lawyer and clubman in a bill of particulars supporting his divorce suit filed last year.

The three co-defendants named today were Horace H. Work, financier, with office in Fifth Avenue and a home at Madison, N. J.; Talbot W. Chambers, connected with a real company, which bears his name, and Maurice Patis, an architect, with offices in Manhattan.

Work, who is married, and Patis now live at Palm Beach, Fla. When Symington filed his suit, Mrs. Symington asked for payments at the rate of \$20,000 annually until the case should be decided. Subsequently she was awarded \$1,500 a month by Supreme Court Justice Pitcock, who directed Symington to pay the sum of her apartment pending the outcome of the case.

MOVING MOUNTAIN SHIFTS 150 YARDS

MEEKER, Col., March 26.—Meecker's "moving mountain" stopped its trek into the Rio Blanca Valley last night after having "shifted" approximately 150 yards to a broader base, observers today declared.

Beyond the phenomenon of the "shifting" of the mountain which ecologists say is not unusual, except in cases of peaks as high and large as the Meecker "moving mountain" the present mounding of this mountain caused little excitement in the region except to block the highway between Rifle and this town for a distance of some 600 yards.

Residents of this region stated today that the filling up of a gulch in the Rio Blanca valley will spare the towns of Meecker and Rifle the expense of building a bridge to complete a highway.
