MAY MAKE GOLD FROM MERCURY IN SEPARATING DEVICE

CHICAGO, Mar. 26.—Two machines pronounced among the most efficient thus far built for separating an element into different chemical elements are to be completed in the Kent Chemical laboratory of the University of Chicago. One is used for chlorine separation. From the other, mercury is caused to run out a different substance from that which was put in, lighter substance in the mercury being separated from the heavier by causing the atoms of mercury to jump about in the machine at seven times the speed of the fastest express train.

Their mercury separator, chemists say, will be of value in connection with experiments being undertaken on the transformation of mercury into gold.

PRINCE OF WALES PREPARES FOR TRIP

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) PLYMOUTH, Eng., Mar. 26.—Everything is in readiness aboard H. M. S. Repulse for the Prince of Wales' voyage to South Africa and South America, beginning Saturday.

The grim battle cruiser has been scrubbed and polished until she looks like a jeweled ship, with brass and nickel blazing in the sun and her decks and sides spotless.

The twelfth successive man-of-war to bear that name under the Union Jack, the Repulse will be the crack ship of His Majesty's fleet during the time the Prince is aboard. Only the best of officers and tars have been chosen to accompany the Prince and every day life on board while Wales' standard is at the foremast will be a rigid display of discipline and tidiness.

When other craft dip their flags in salute they will be paying homage to a living example of the splendor of Britain's sea power—a fighter 794 feet long, of 38,000 tons, carrying a main battery of six 15 inch guns and a crew of 1,250 men with engines capable of hurling the whole mass through the water at 33 knots an hour.

At the time the Prince is aboard he plans to carry a daily program of gymnastics in much the same manner as he occupies himself while at St. James Palace. His quarters on the Repulse will contain a gymnasium, bedroom, bath and smoking room.

The gymnasium, a virtual reproduction of the one at the Palace, with the addition to the usual apparatus of a mechanical horse, to substitute for the hunting rides in which Wales has indulged extensively this year.

"Anything will do for sleeping quarters," the Prince said, "but I want a complete gymnasium handy."

FINALE IN TEAPOT DOME CASE REACHED

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) CHEYENNE, Wyo., Mar. 26.—The finale of the Teapot Dome lease annulment trial was reached here today when Owen J. Roberts of government counsel, delivered the final argument before Federal Judge T. H. Keenan. Mr. Roberts started his argument by defending the government's bill of complaint which the defense alleged was too general to be effective as a statement of cause of action. The government read from the rules of the United States supreme court, which require, he said, only a statement of ultimate facts in a complaint.

EUGENE THEATER MAN DIES TODAY

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) EUGENE, Ore., March 26.—Aron H. McDonald, owner of the Rex Theatre here, and of the new Lowell Theatre now under process of construction, died at a local hospital this morning. He was well known in coast and theatrical and business circles.

Some 14 years ago he formed the first film exchange in Portland, and later built the Rex Theatre and moved here. He had been here for 12 years, and during that time had owned the Castle Theatre, now dismantled with the construction of the new Lowell and the old Eugene Theatre, which is now owned by the Heilig company.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Donald Lee McDonald; one son, Mason McDonald of Eugene and one other brother, Robert McDonald, of San Francisco.

INTER-RACIAL IDEA ENDORSED BY CAL

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) CINCINNATI, Mar. 26.—The movement for adjustment of race relations was endorsed by President Calvin Coolidge in a letter read before the national inter-racial conference which opened here last night. Addressed to George E. Haynes secretary of the committee on the church and racial relations, the "Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America," the letter read: "The evidence of developing

public opinion in support of co-operation among the racial groups in this country is a matter of satisfaction to all who have the nation's best interests at heart. The development of the inter-racial understanding through co-operative plans, and the action of leaders of races in local communities has contributed largely to this increasing good will.

"I feel that the national inter-racial conference called to bring local leaders from many states to exchange views and plans is worthy of endorsement and support by all who are interested in effective adjustment of race returns.

"I send my wishes for success to the two commissions and to this inter-racial conference."
