## STAR CAR MAKES STEEP GRADE TO TOP OF MT. NEBO

Thrilling Hill Climbing Exhibition Put on by Star Auto Agency Today.

### ENGINEER DRIVES

Julius Ducevior, Factory Designer, Pilots Powerful Car in Dangerous Effort.

One of the most thrilling hill climbing tests ever witnessed in Roseburg, was seen this morning when a Star car taken from the sales rooms of the local Star agency, was driven over the summit of Mt. Nebo by Julius Ducevior, factory engineer, and one of the designers of the popular automobile.

On two attempts the car went almost three-fourths of the way up the grade, and on the third test pushed its way up to the top and came to a stand beside the flagpole which marks the summit.

This is considered a wonderful accomplishment and demonstrates beyond all question the power which exists in the motor which is built in the Star cars.

The machine went up the course which motorcycles find a most severe test, going up the steep grade without a pause on the final run. The grade is from 45 to 77 per cent. It is stated, while the course is rough and ungraded, and in some places soft.

On the first two tests the machine bounced so on the rough ground that it was unable to get sufficient traction to pull the steep portion of the grade. Before the final test was run the air pressure in the tires was reduced, which eliminated the bouncing, and with additional weight on the rear the car walked up to the top of the hill, apparently with considerable power unused.

Mr. Ducevior is one of the noted drivers of the country, and has made successful hill climbs with the Star car. He recently made a climb of the famous Watterman hill in Los Angeles, and last night, following his arrival here, received a call to return to Los Angeles to repeat the exhibition.

Determined to climb the Mount Nebo grade he made several attempts after dark last night, trying to get to the summit before his departure for California. The bouncing lights of the car, however, did not afford sufficient details of the ground and so he repeated the attempt this morning. Before his test today he announced that a failure this morning would mean his return later with special heavy chains, for he was determined to reach the top.

The car used was an ordinary stock model, which had been driven only 200 miles, equipped with balloon tires, and carrying heavy chains to afford sufficient traction.

The climb was a dangerous and exciting one, for on several occasions the front wheels of the car were clear of the ground and steering was impossible.

Rapp Brothers, the local Star dealers, were greatly elated with the successful termination of the effort. Leo Rapp rode in the car on the successful attempt.

The test which was unheralded was nevertheless witnessed by a large crowd of people, besides those who stood on Cass and Oak streets and watched the car make its successful journey up the steep grade.

Mr. Ducevior left this afternoon for Oakland, California, from where he will be taken by auto to Los Angeles, to make another test climb. Upon his departure he was wearing a fine new \$15 hat, which he won from Garry Rapp, one of the members of the firm which has the Star agency, and who wagered that the car would never go up the grade.

### GOVERNOR TO ASK DAY'S OBSERVANCE

will be the one hundred and fiftieth anniversary of the battle of Lexington and Concord, the first real battle in the first war in the history of mankind where the issue was human rights. The American revolution established a new era in human affairs.

"For eight long, weary years, the war that commenced at Lexington continued through the greatest nation on earth, and the brave, though badly organized, American colonies. When the fates gave their final decree to the stars and stripes at Yorktown, a new nation came forth in the affairs of the world, built on rock of individual rights of man.

when she struck her head on the stone corridor. She was revived quickly and taken to the prison hospital to stay until court convenes this afternoon. SAN FRANCISCO, Mar. 26.—A possibility that the defense may attempt to contest the charge of the state that Dorothy Ellingson actually shot and killed her mother appeared this afternoon. By noon the defense had five more preliminary challenges by which to excuse jurors, the state six. There was a possibility that the jury would be obtained by evening.

Walter McGovern of defense counsel asked Mrs. Julia Ott, a prospective juror, whether she would be prejudiced against a verdict in favor of the girl should the evidence disclose that Dorothy had not actually shot her mother, but had admitted the act to shield some one else.

This was the first intimation that the defense contemplated resisting the state's establishment of the body of the alleged crime. At the time of her arrest in January the 16-year-old girl freely discussed the quarrel with her mother over the girl's jazy life and joy rides which the girl said led her in a fit of temper to shoot her mother in the bed room of her home.

The girl, as she left court for the noon recess, supported by attendants, slumped into a faint and was carried to an ante-room. She had lost consciousness completely.

SAN FRANCISCO, Mar. 26.—The trial of 16-year-old Dorothy Ellingson, charged with having shot and killed her mother, Mrs. Anna Ellingson, was resumed here today with attorneys for the defense and prosecution making the same painstaking selection of the jury which will try the young defendant, and with precautionary measures in force to guard against a physical and mental breakdown of the girl.
