NOTICE FOR BIDS FOR SCHOOL BONDS OF SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 4 IN DOUGLAS COUNTY, OREGON

NOTICE is hereby given that the undersigned will, up to 7:30 o'clock P. M. of April 14, 1925, receive at his office in the City of Roseburg, Douglas County, Oregon, sealed bids for the purchase of negotiable serial coupon bonds of School District No. 4 in Douglas County, Oregon, in the sum of \$155,000.00.

Said bonds will be in denominations of \$1,000.00 each, dated May 1, 1925, and maturing as follows: 6 bonds to mature May 1, 1926; 6 bonds to mature annually on May 1st of each and every year thereafter including May 1, 1933; 11 bonds to mature annually on May 1st of each and every year thereafter including May 1, 1940; 10 bonds to mature annually on May 1st of each and every year thereafter including May 1, 1944. Said bonds will draw five per cent interest, payable semi-annually on November 1st and May 1st, and the principal and interest shall be payable in lawful money of the United States of America at the office of the treasurer of Douglas County, Oregon, or at the Federal Reserve Bank of Portland, Oregon, or at the State of Oregon in the City and County of New York at the option of the purchaser.

All bids must be accompanied by a certified check payable to School District No. 4 of Douglas County, Oregon, in an amount equal to five per cent of the amount of said bid to be forfeited to the School District in case the bidder shall fail to complete the purchase of said bonds in accordance with the terms of his bid. Said bids shall be opened at a public meeting of the school board of said district to be held in the school board room in the high school in said district on the 14th day of April, 1925, at 7:30 o'clock P. M. and the bonds shall be sold by the board to the highest and best bidder but for not less than par and accrued interest. MRS. VANDERBILT HAUNTED BY FEAR OF BLACKMAILER

(Associated Press Local Wire.)
NEW YORK, Mar. 27.—Mrs. William K. Vanderbilt, attended by a half dozen policemen, conducted a thorough search of her five-story residence at Fifth Avenue and Fifty Third Street early today after she had reported seeing the reflection of an intruder in the mirror of the dining room.

After a half hour's search police were unable to find anyone or to discover any apparent tampering with floors or windows.

According to one of the officers who had been summoned by a police whistle blown by a servant, Mrs. Vanderbilt carried a revolver during the search. Police said this was the third time within the last few weeks that they had been summoned to the Vanderbilt home to seek suspected intruders. Letters threatening harm to her if she did not pay \$50,000 were received last winter by Mrs. Vanderbilt. Bern Sirro, 20, was arrested and pleaded guilty to blackmail and extortion. He was released under suspended sentence and a two-year parole last month on condition that he return to his father's ranch near Fresno, Cal. He also was alleged to have written a letter to Philip Rhinelandt demanding \$20,000.

A watchman keeps guard outside her residence, but Mrs. Vanderbilt feared an intruder had slipped past the guard early today. She and one of her daughters were in a reading room on the second floor shortly after midnight when she thought she heard noises below. She said she investigated and saw the reflection of a man in the mirror. She was positive he fled when she entered the room with a revolver.

KANSAS SENATOR IS PREDICTING SUCCESS

(Associated Press Local Wire.)
CHICAGO, Mar. 27.—Senator Kapper of Kansas, here enroute to his home from Washington, sees prospects of a prosperous year for agriculture—a business revival when farmers market the next crop and come back for the cattle industry within a year.

"If we have only a fair crop and a good price the farmers will be in fine shape this year," he said. "His financial improvement last season did not apparently result in the increased buying power many were looking for. The reason was that the farmer got rid of his debts, his bank debts and back taxes, and this took much of his increased revenue."

"Economists who have studied the situation thoroughly agree that the cattle industry will be on a prosperous footing within the next year or so. This means a great deal, for in recent years it has been in extremity, and many wealthy cattlemen with great herds in the west have had their fortunes wiped out."

Strack defeated by Kruse in the 175-pound class was victorious in the heavyweight class and will probably meet the Oregon wrestler again today in that class.

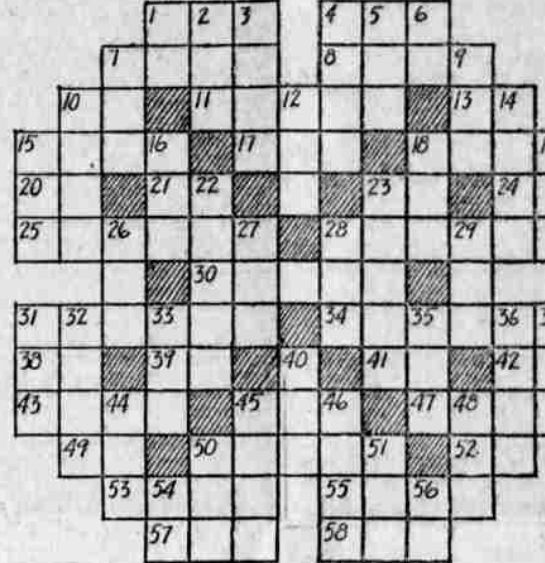

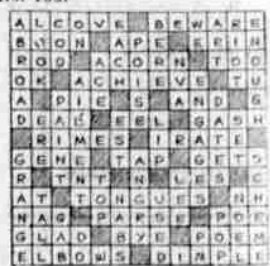

How to Solve Puzzle.

The best way to solve this crossword puzzle is to run over the list of horizontal and vertical words in search of evidence or "easy" words. If horizontal, the word you are looking for must extend crosswise from the number to the first shaded stop on the right; if vertical, it must extend downward from the number to the first shaded stop below. When finished, the words should read equally well crosswise and downward.

GOOD PROGRESS AT LEEPER DOME WELL

Drilling at the Leeper Dome oil well in going forward very satisfactorily according to W. L. Cobb, general manager. The work was held up for three days while the head griller, J. J. Woodruff, was ill with flu. The machinery is being operated daily however, and very satisfactory progress is being made. The early indications were so good, that the company is enlarging the hole below the first casing, making it uniform in size. Several weeks ago a fire showing was struck and casing was inserted in order to make a test. A good flow was found, but the oil was not in commercial quantities so that it was decided to go deeper. With almost definite assurance that oil would be found, the plans were changed slightly.

After inserting a casing, it is necessary to reduce the size of the hole each casing off being followed by a reduction in the size of the hole. It is evident that at a great depth the hole would become quite small and if a heavy flow of oil should be struck the size of the shaft would prevent the taking of as large an amount of oil as a large hole.

With this in mind it was decided to keep the hole at its full 10-inch size as deep as possible, and this is being done in the present drilling.

GLENDALE MAN DIES SUDDENLY OF APOPLEXY

Charles Fetters, a farmer living about a mile this side of Wolf Creek, died very suddenly last Saturday evening of apoplexy. Mr. Fetters had been in apparent good health even when he ate his supper, but died almost immediately after being stricken. He came to this neighborhood about four years ago from Ohio, and was well liked by those who enjoyed his acquaintance. He was a member of the I. O. O. F. The funeral services were held from the Olivet Presbyterian church in this city Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock. Rev. Joseph W. Angell officiating, and interment was made in the Masonic cemetery in this city. Besides his wife, Mr. Fetters leaves a daughter, Mrs. (La Rot) Robert Wilson and a host of friends. He was sixty years old at the time of his death. —Glendale News.
