The two men then went to Chehalis where they separated, later they met in Portland. In that city the one who had taken the diamond sold it to a salesman, whom he had previously known, for \$35.

Dispatches published here today indicated conflict of opinion as to whether a body found Sunday in a shallow grave near Chehalis was that of a man whom Arman Dornier and James Mack, inmates of the Oregon penitentiary, confessed yesterday they had slain.

One dispatch stated that the body found Sunday was undoubtedly that of the man whom Dornier and Mack said they saw along the road as they were driving south from Seattle in a stolen automobile last May.

This narrative left the body in a grave beyond Chehalis. Another telegram said Sheriff Roberts of Lewis county expressed doubt, pointing out that while the body found Sunday, which was near the Tilton river, about 30 miles east of Chehalis, had been dead as long as last May, it seemed to have been only a short time in that place. The sheriff also remarked that the spot would have been a very hard one for strangers to reach.

TUNNEY TRIUMPHS OVER GREB WHILE GIBBONS LOOKS ON

ST. PAUL, Minn., Mar. 28.—Tommy Gibbons, St. Paul heavyweight, whose next engagement will probably be a 15-round contest with Gene Tunney, American lightweight champion, expressed the opinion today that Tunney would give him a good hard fight. Gibbons witnessed Tunney's triumph over Harry Greb here last night, watching Tunney in action for the first time. He never took his eyes off the hard punching New Yorker during the ten rounds of vicious fighting.

"Tunney is a big strong fellow and ought to give me a good hard fight," Gibbons said. "I like the way he boxes. He hits hard and accurately." Tunney gave Greb as thorough a beating in their ten-round decision as he has ever received. To Greb's credit he showed remarkable assimilative powers in standing up under Tunney's vicious attack.

The assault was the result of an argument, Raker first attacking Hanson with a banjo. It is said, next with a knife club and inflicting a knife wound near the heart. It is believed immediate care may save the aged man's life, though he is very weak from his wounds and lack of care since the attack. He is a bachelor and has been alone. TELEPHONE MILEAGE ENCIRCLES GLOBE

"Very few, if any of our local citizens, would realize that it is a common practice for the local telephone exchange to handle sufficient long distance calls that, if the mileage was totaled, the distance would almost equal the distance around the world," states John R. Farrington, manager of the local Pacific Telephone & Telegraph exchange.

"This is just what happened for instance on Friday, March 27, which was just an average busy day and the total mileage was exactly 21,897. One can better appreciate this result when some of the details are known—for instance, there were 45 calls to Portland, one to Los Angeles, three to San Francisco, two to Seattle and one to Vallejo, Cal. Should these figures be compiled on days when calls were handled to extremely distant points the result would be vastly different, as on one day recently two calls were completed to New York."
