FAMILY FEUD IS REVIVED; ONE DEAD (Associated Press Licensed Wire.) WELLINGTON, Colo., Mar. 20.—W. O. Farmer, 70, a rancher near here, was shot dead yesterday by his son-in-law, Ike C. Rice, 25, as the culmination of a feud that started many years ago in North Carolina. Mrs. Rice, Farmer's daughter, witnessed the killing. Rice surrendered after the slaying and is in jail at Fort Collins. The Farmer and Rice families were bitter enemies, owing Rice instead of healing the old wounds, the elopement made conditions worse. One of the families moved to Colorado. Soon the other followed. Both took up residences on farms near Wellington. Recently Farmer missed a gun from his home. Rice was accused of having taken it. The two clans clashed yesterday. According to witnesses, the old man tried to take a shot gun away from his son-in-law but was unsuccessful. Then Rice shot at him and he was killed.
