WASHINGTON, Mar. 30.—American Indians of all tribes already have contributed \$50,000 toward a \$125,000 fund for construction of an athletic stadium at Haskell Indian Institute, Lawrence, Kan. Subscriptions are limited to Indians.

The stadium will seat 20,000 and probably will be of an architecture illustrative of Indian art. It will contain a quarter mile track, baseball diamond and football field and a layout for field meets.

### FORD DISPLAY WEEK FEATURED

Tractor production has been moved up to 450 a day to meet increasing demands, it was also announced.

### REMNANT OF OLD SLOCUM HALL BEING TORN DOWN TODAY

Workmen are today tearing down the old blacksmith shop in the rear of the Kohlhaugen building in order to make room for the new concrete structure which Mr. Kohlhaugen is erecting there. This old wooden shop was once one of the principal store buildings in Roseburg, being a part of the old Slocum Hall, for many years Roseburg's chief meeting place. The old Slocum Hall faced on Jackson street, the lower floor being used for a store building, while the upper hall was an auditorium used for gatherings of all kinds, social occasions, dances and public entertainments. The first motion picture show ever given in Roseburg was shown in this hall, which also for many years was the polling place for Roseburg and the whole countryside.

In 1908 Mr. Kohlhaugen moved the old hall back from Jackson street, and erected the fine building now occupied by the several stores and headline conservatory. The upper story of the Slocum hall was torn off, enough lumber being procured to build two houses, while the lower story was roofed over and has been in use as a blacksmith shop for many years.

### FORFEIT BIG SUM IF BOOZE IS USED

PHILADELPHIA, Mar. 30.—A legal agreement with a \$10,000 fine for violation, binds Samuel M. Vauclain, president of the Baldwin Locomotive Works, to strict observance of the Volstead Act while in this country. It was learned today. Mr. Vauclain signed the agreement with the late W. A. Garrett, A. S. Gobie and W. A. Hoy, Baldwin officials, on May 18, 1924, the others agreeing to forfeit \$1,000 each if they violated it.

Mr. Vauclain disclosed the agreement on his 68th birthday, while enroute through Texas on his private car. The agreement, it was said, cites the designers to obey the laws, "not only because they are right, but also because it will result in mental, moral and physical good."

### LETTERS FROM THE PEOPLE

#### CONCERNING RACE DECAY

To the Editor: Almost daily in newspapers and in magazines we read editorials and articles on race decay. In a recent publication of nation-wide circulation, Dr. John Harvey Kellogg, president of the race betterment foundation, has an article on "race decay—our greatest menace." How many writers and commentators on this age old evil treat it as a local, individual disorder, when in fact it is a deadly disease of the social organism. Up to this day and hour the brightest minds in history all agree that every social structure built upon the foundation of enmity and ignorance, has as inevitably developed the germs of race decay; as truly as fifth decade consumption, and the ruins of every pre-existing civilization from the Incas to the Romans are decayed into dust; evidence to the fact that no order of things built upon the foundation of conquest, slavery and exploitation can long endure. In our every day life we see and feel the expressed manifestations of race decay, we see the institutions of home, family, morals, ethics, education, religion and politics; all victims of this dreaded enemy, and we shudder as we see the standard of living falling to a lower level, never conscious of the underlying fact, that it is a provision inherent in every organization that when it has served its purpose it dies and decays, and that the period of its existence depends altogether upon the harmonious relationship of the law in its government. It is a positive as night follows day that our present social structure is crumbling into decay; and what the succeeding order will be depends upon our intelligence; it altogether depends upon our ability to direct the new order in a channel of betterment. No civilization built upon enmity and ignorance can long endure; for every safe, sure, and harmless invention to counteract justice and intelligence has failed, and humanity and its order have repeatedly been destroyed and how shall we ever know what mankind has suffered in this process? If it be our earnest desire to direct the coming order into the channel of betterment, through the gateway of intelligence, then we must begin and found the new order with all of his superstructure in harmony with the forces of endurance and to accomplish this we need after only a single word in the course of the advance creation. Thus shall we see that by the sweat of the brow and not sweat of the brow of other's labor. We cannot attain salvation in any form as long as we have destruction in every form. We shall see or realize the golden rule until we build on a firm foundation the resilient rule: "Give to each all the fruits of their labors." Let this be the base for the foundations of the coming order, and from this base alone must a civilization arise that will stand by the test of time, as it is justice and intelligence, and every argument, combat never invented is as naught. It will stand the test of time and stand alone, because it is equal with all.

### WORSHIPPERS IN CLASH WITH TROOPS

MEXICO CITY, Mar. 30.—Two officers and four privates were wounded and 68 men, ten women and one Spanish priest were arrested, the result of a clash between federal soldiers and worshippers outside the church of San Marcos in Aguas Calientes yesterday.

The worshippers who for some time have been guarding the church building are declared in reports to have opened fire upon the soldiers as the latter approached the church on patrol duty, the guardians of the edifice believing the troops intended to take over the business of transferring it to members of the newly created Mexican Apostolic church. It is believed several worshippers were wounded, but are remaining in hiding for fear of arrest.

President Calles has ordered the military commandant at the town to take energetic action for the suppression of disorders.
