NEW ENGLAND IS RECOVERING FROM STORM AND FLOOD

BOSTON, Mar. 29.—New England was recovering today from the effects of snow, hail and floods and rains which yesterday caused thousands of dollars of damage. One death was caused when an auto driver, whose vision was obscured by snow, ran down a man on Providence street.

MONTREAL, Mar. 29.—Rising of the St. Lawrence river and its tributaries due to breaking ice dams and rains threatened to flood several riverside towns today.

QUEBEC, Mar. 29.—Considerable damage has been caused in the valley of the Beauve, Chaudiere and Yamachiche rivers by rising waters. Families living near the banks were moving to higher ground today and more serious floods were feared unless the weather turned colder soon.

At St. Georges, four feet of water stood in streets nearest the river. Cellars were flooded and street traffic except by boat, was impossible.

WOODROW, SASK., Mar. 29.—Slight recessions were reported today in floods which carried away three bridges weakened a fourth and took two lives in this district yesterday.

WHEAT PRICES ON THE DECLINE

CHICAGO, Mar. 29.—Wheat suffered a big break in value today just before the close. May delivery was smashed to six low as \$1.42, a loss of 12c. The close was wild, ranging all the way from 3 to 11 cents net lower with May \$1.46 to \$1.47 and July \$1.26 to \$1.27.

Announcement that the United States' visible supply today showed a decrease of only 2,669,000 bushels in the last week was disappointing to holders of wheat, many of whom had expected a falling off of 4,000,000 bushels.

At about the same time there were reports from railroad sources that the new crop of wheat in Southwest Kansas was better than generally reported. Price declines which ensued brought quickly into play numerous standing orders to sell out and stop losses.

Extreme low prices for the day in the wheat market, were reached in the last quarter hour of the board of trade session. May wheat shot downward to \$1.41 but rebounded to \$1.47 at the finish, closing wild at \$1.46 to \$1.47.

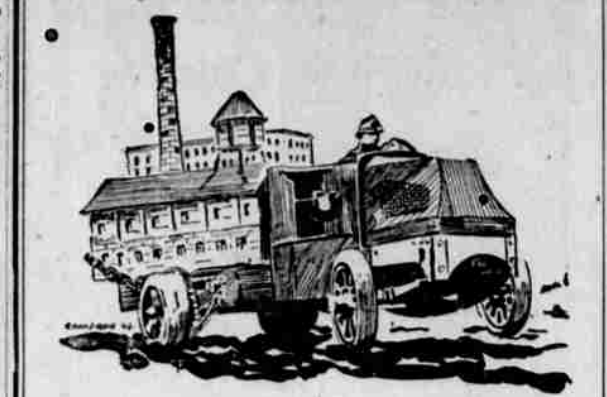
