COURT MARTIAL CAPTAIN (Associated Press Leased Wire.) ORLEANS, France, Mar. 31.—Political, diplomatic and military celebrities have been subpoenaed to appear at the court martial which is being resumed today of Captain Jacques Sadoul. He was sentenced to death in 1919 on charges of deserting to the Bolsheviks while a member of the French military mission to Russia. He returned to France last December and demanded a retrial. The defense has called among others former Premier Caillaux and former Minister of the Interior Malvy, who were granted amnesty last November for war-time offenses. Although no manifestations are expected, precautions have been taken to cope with possible incidents.

WHEAT STILL ON SERIOUS DECLINE (Associated Press Leased Wire.) CHICAGO, Mar. 31.—Heavy calls for additional funds to protect brokerage houses from possibility of losses incident to big fluctuations compelled many holders of wheat today to make sacrifice sales. This intensified the weakness of the market, already wavering as a result of selling in which foreigners were conspicuous. Selling from European sources which suddenly dropped out in the wheat market here was associated with reports that current financial trouble in European continental countries was feared. So violent and rapid did price changes become that news tickers and quotation blackboards failed to keep anywhere near the actual trading figures in the wheat pit. At 1.85 for the May delivery of wheat, however, demand broadened and rallied at 2 cents a bushel eased.

O. & C. GRANT LAND TIMBER SALE HELD BY LAND OFFICE The U. S. land office in this city today disposed of approximately fifteen million feet of timber for about \$43,000, the land all lying in Coos County, tributary to Coos Bay, and being part of the O. and C. railroad grant lands. The buyers were Menasha Woodmen Ware company, North Bend, three million feet, \$6,050.08; D. N. McNair, Myrtle Point, one million and a half feet, \$2,865.72; Western Lumber Manufacturing company, Marshfield, one million feet, \$6,900; A. E. Adelaperger, W. J. Conrad, Marshfield, D. N. McNair, and E. C. Roberts, Myrtle Point, ten million feet, \$28,280. The sale included approximately four million feet of Port Orford cedar, the Western Lumber Manufacturing company procuring 800,000 feet of this cedar and the four purchasers of the large tract slightly in excess of three million feet. Port Orford cedar, buyers report is bringing good money and is the only kind of lumber that is "holding" at the present time. They expect to remove the cedar, leaving the fir standing at present. They have ten years in which to remove the timber after which title to the land itself reverts to the government and will be open to entry as agricultural land under the homestead act.
