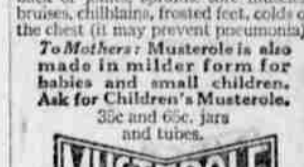

CLOSING OF LAW SCHOOL DEBATED

PARIS, Apr. 1.—The contest over the suspension of Dean Berthelmy of the Sorbonne's law faculty and closing of the law school by the government after student manifestations against the appointment of Dr. George Scelle to the chair of international law has shifted from the Latin quarter to Parliament.

The Chamber of Deputies debated the question until 3 o'clock this morning and then the governments handling of the situation was endorsed by a vote of 302 to 220.

The Minister of Education, Francois Albert in a speech which was frequently interrupted said political agitation was responsible for the trouble.

Premier Herriot wound up the debate by asserting: "It is our duty to react against this, the first act of the kind of Fascism now being prompted."

Opposition speakers condemned the government's action as clumsy, tactless and a gross blunder.
